Georgetown Man Placed In Custody

GEORGETOWN — A Georgetown man was placed in custody in Kings County Jail yesterday afternoon after RCMP officers from the Montague and Charlottetown Detachment entered his home after being forced to surround the area and tear gas into his house.

The chain of events started about 9:45 Saturday night when a man entered the Royal Canadian Legion Home carrying a .303 rifle which he is reported to have loaded there and then left. Shortly after town policeman Charles Jackson who had just entered his car at the court house a half block from the legion home was shot at but he or his car were not hit.

RCMP assistance called for by the legion home was in collision with his home where he was alone. He stationed himself at an open upstairs window and refused all appeals of police and relatives to leave the house. He allowed relatives to enter on several occasions to procure medicine for his child who was at another house at the time.

The house was kept under surveillance during the night and relatives again went to the house Sunday morning but he would only allow them to come so close to him.

In early afternoon on Sunday for speeding, and Donald Collicut of Alberton was fined \$10 and costs for driving the wrong way on a one-way street.

A Sherbrooke man, Lea Compton, charged with theft of a suit of clothes from Corney's Family Store, pleaded not guilty, and trial was set down for Tuesday.

The police cleared the streets in the immediate vicinity and stationed themselves behind buildings in the area and brought tear gas into play.

A short time later the man in the house threw the rifle out an upstairs window after it was reported having fired one shot.

A short time later the police equipped with gas masks entered the dwelling and escorted the man outside and to jail.

The man recently received medical treatment in the hospital.

SACKVILLE, N.B. (CP) — Rev. Owen C. Sharkey of St. Dunstan's University in Charlottetown was elected president Saturday of the newly-named Atlantic Provinces Psychological Association.

He succeeds Dr. Arthur Sullivan of Memorial University in St. John's, Nfld.

WAGE INCREASE
Average weekly wages and salaries in Prince Edward Island rose in June of this year the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports. The island's average was \$63.84 compared to \$63.32 in May of this year and \$60.81 in June of last year. Blaze Causes Heavy Damage

C. C. Gregory Passes Away

NEW GLASGOW (CP)—Chester C. Gregory, a well-known hockey player in the Maritimes for many years, died in hospital here Saturday night after a lengthy illness. He was 82.

A native of Charlottetown, he came to New Glasgow in 1910 to play hockey and performed with a number of teams in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. Known for years as "Mr. Hockey," his hockey ability earned him a berth in the Nova Scotia sports hall of fame.

He is survived by his second wife, Jean, a daughter, Mrs. Melba Dewar of New Glasgow, and a brother, Oliver, in Charlottetown.

The funeral will be held here Tuesday.

Chairmen Announce Committee

A joint committee to study and report on possible areas of co-operation between the two universities will be set up by the Boards of Governors of St. Dunstan's and Prince of Wales. The committee is to start work, but not be limited by, the report of the Royal Commission on Higher Education as a basis for the proposed study.

Announcement of the new committee was made jointly by Judge C. St. Clair Trainor and Dr. John Gillis, chairmen of the Boards of Governors of St. Dunstan's and Prince of Wales respectively, following a weekend joint meeting of the boards.
