

# Tough Sukarno Policy Scares Away Capital

**JAKARTA (AP)** — President Sukarno's confrontation policy toward the British-backed Malaysia federation apparently has scared off foreign capital and resulted in an urgent call for domestic investment.

"To hell with foreign aid," Sukarno has said, if foreign offers were based on insistence that Indonesia abandon its hard policy against neighboring Malaysia.

Now Indonesia's senior minister of finance Sumarno has been quoted as saying Indonesia will likely be receiving less foreign economic aid because of "political developments."

Antara, the official news agency, said Sumarno told a conference of economic planners the country has not reached the minimum percentage of investment needed for economic development.

"An investment of as much as five per cent of the national

income cannot be considered big and yet this has not been achieved in Indonesia," Su marno said.

**MUST INCREASE VOLUME**

He said investment volume must be increased "in order to curb the decline in a standard of living resulting from the population increase."

The conference was reported trying to plan a national economic development program based on the principle of "relying on our own resources."

At the same time, Antara complained that Indonesia's loss on business with Malaysia, Indonesia's former No. 1 trade partner, was being circumvented by smugglers and devious means.

Indonesia refused to recognize the federation when it was formed last September and cut off all legal trade relations. Sukarno said he would crush the federation.

Antara said the amount of in-

donesian rubber reaching Singapore and Malaya almost equals the volume going there before the establishment of Malaysia.

It said rubber now is reaching Malaysia illegally—an apparent reference to the brisk smuggling trade—or through so-called "legal" export, meaning shipments destined officially for other countries are being diverted to Malaysia.

**QUOTE FIGURES**

Attributing its report to information gathered in New York and Washington, Antara said since September a monthly average of 5,000 tons of Indonesian rubber still had found its way illegally (smuggled) into the federation, it said about 15,000 to 20,000 tons reach Malaya and Singapore by being diverted from their official official destination. It gave 35,000 tons as the average monthly total go-

selfed through Malaya and Singapore, whose advanced technical methods could readily be material for market better than Indonesia's poor processing facilities.

Since last September, Indonesia has sent missions abroad to obtain capital and technical knowledge for development of its own facilities.

Foreign owned rubber concerns also are engaged actively in Indonesia in development projects, working on contractual relations in p and production sharing basis with state-owned enterprises.

## New Plants In N.B. Seen Aid To Maritimes

**SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)** — A cross-section of Maritime provinces industry is expected to reap increasing benefits from the decisions of three Ontario firms to establish mobile homes manufacturing plants in New Brunswick.

Total value of production when the third branch plant is operating later this year will be well over \$4,000,000 annually, with most of the homes intended for markets in the Atlantic provinces and northern Quebec.

More than 100 locally recruited workers will be employed in the plants after training by specialists from head offices of Glendale Mobile Homes, Strathroy, Ont.; 20th Century Mobile Homes, London and Pyramid Mobile Homes, Windsor.

Retail outlets have taken delivery of the first units from 20th Century's plant near Montague and Glendale's branch operation at Sussex. Pyramid plans completion later this summer of government-built quarters at Fredericton.

Local purchases of component parts may mean as much or more to the region as the actual employment of the plants, as firms find orders coming in for items ranging from steel frames to furniture.

BUY IN N.S., N.B.

These are purchased now in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, as well as all the lumber and plywood used in the homes, stoves, mattresses and floor tile.

Plumbing systems, glass and almost any other part of the completed unit could be purchased in the Maritimes if prices are competitive, plant managers stated.

Manager Leon Cooke of 20th Century's Scoudoune plant said components for his firm's entire Canadian production may be bought in this area because of favorable freight rates to the London headquarters.

John Dewinter, manager of Glendale's Sussex plant, felt "the freighting firms may be the major beneficiaries, although we now purchase much of our material, right down to nuts and bolts, in the Maritimes."

The assembly lines need a steady influx of components as

Windsor office said the branch at Fredericton would aim at production of one mobile home and 10 travel trailers daily, employing 60 men directly and another 50 indirectly.

Production of the smaller travel trailers—under 26 feet in length and called "pups" in the industry—was the immediate aim of all three operations.

But the two operative plants found the influx of orders for the larger mobile homes forced postponement of the other line until next year.

The lion's share of early production will go to a chain of retail distributors in the Atlantic region and Quebec, although some units have been sent through Ontario to western Canada.

This was possible because of filling the western orders here as cheaply as it could be done from the Ontario plant.

One of the firms is considering good shipping facilities was cited as an aid to such a move.

One large retail operator, who has ordered the full first year's production of one model

from each branch plant, commented: "It's a concrete example of the type of industry sought for this area by several development bodies. The idea is to prevent millions of dollars from leaving the area and becoming 'lost money' as far as the Maritimes go."
