# India's Stand On Kashmir Causes Dismay In Britain

LONDON (CP) — India's stand on Kashmir has caused dismay among the republic's warmest supporters in Britain.

Prime Minister Nehru's long-time critics say the Kashmir dispute simply shows him in his true colors. India's partisan approach distresses observers who admire the prime minister's emphasis on morality in international relations.

They detect symptoms of the nationalistic self-interest that Indian spokesmen have often denounced in other countries. They feel Nehru is exhibiting a double standard.

British opinion appears to favor Pakistan in the argument over the beautiful vale of Kashmir.

Two of Nehru's stoutest supporters in Britain, the Manchester Guardian, independent Liberal, and the left-wing Daily Mirror, showed their disappointment in cartoons Wednesday.

David Low, in The Guardian, pictures Nehru seated at a desk

strewn with papers labelled Kashmir. A hand stretches out to remove a scrap of paper representing the leadership of the world. "You won't need this now," the caption says.

**MORAL AUTHORITY?**

In The Mirror, the hard-hitting cartoonist Vicky conveys the same point with a book, open at a page marked "India's moral authority." Splashed across the clean white sheet is a blob of ink: "Kashmir."

The two papers reflect the outlook of British observers sympathetic to India and conscious of the importance to the West of her democratic experiment.

This reason was strikingly evident Monday night at a dinner in London to celebrate the founding of the Indian republic. There were guarded references in conversations and speeches and many Indians made plain their misgivings. Madame Vijaya Lakshmi Pandit, Indian High Commissioner in London, did not refer to Kashmir by name but begged her audience to bear in mind India's difficulties in trying to create a democracy, particularly in trying to harmonize the religious and cultural aspirations of the masses.

Among Indian observers, there

appear to be two main impressions—one that Nehru is acting irrationally, the other that the final story has not yet been told, that negotiations are still going on, and that it would be wrong to reach premature conclusions.

Letters to the editor have indicated some feeling among Indian students that Kashmir is Nehru's blind spot.

**COULD HELP ELSEWHERE**

The Observer, a Sunday newspaper which takes an independent line, says India's behavior in Kashmir is "particularly regrettable at a time when India's moral credit could be usefully employed in helping to deal with much bigger international issues."

Right-wing British opinion is blunter. The Daily Express, for instance, wants the United Nations to apply sanctions against "w r o n g d o e r Nehru." It urges other countries to stop exporting goods to India.

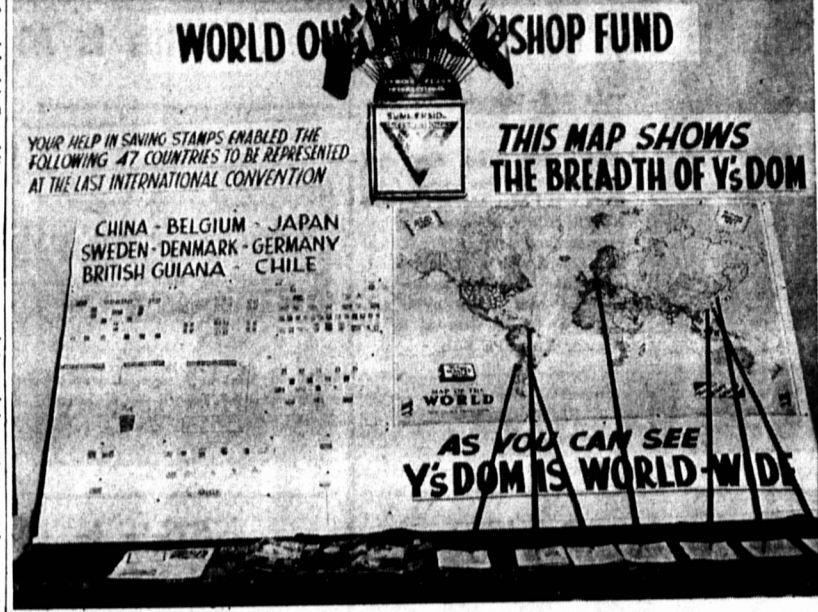

## "Open House" This Afternoon, Tonight At S'side Y Centre

"Open House" at the Summerville "Y" Centre this afternoon and evening will provide the opportunity for public inspection of the newly enlarged "Y" Centre.

Members of the club have spent many hours in the preparation of more than a dozen displays which illustrate the service work and various projects of the Summerville organization.

These displays extend along three sides of the building on the full basement level and are devoted to youth training displays in Scout, Cub, swimming and water safety programs sponsored by the club.

Tea will be served in the afternoon and evening by the Y's Menettes, a club composed of wives of the Y's Men, during the hours of 4.00 to 5.30, and again from 8.30 to 9.00 p.m. when the building and displays are open for public inspection.

The Summerville Y's Men's Club is composed of 52 members. However, the "Y" Centre and its facilities which cost more than \$14,500, are used by more than 300 individuals in Y's Men, Y's Menettes, Hi-Y groups, Scouts, and Cubs.

Among the displays today is an international exhibit illustrating the work of Y's Men in an international way. One of the club members, Charles Linkletter, has the honor of being international youth service director, and is one of four international service directors for the world.

Another club member, Frank Cameron, is district governor for Prince Edward Island, and by coincidence the two men are co-chairmen of the program which has been prepared for today.

**IN 32 COUNTRIES**

The "World Outlook and Bishop Fund" exhibit shows the breadth of the organization which now extends to 32 countries in the world and the exhibit includes articles from Y's Men's World, the official publication depicting the work of Y's Men done by clubs of other countries.

The exhibit also contains examples of the stamp collection program conducted by the club. Officially termed, "The Bishop's Fund", the proceeds from the sale of these stamps is used to enable overseas Y's Men to attend international conventions, to learn the work of Y's Men and to share in the fellowship of the organization. Harry Holman is the club world outlook chairman, and the Maritime regional Bishop's Fund chairman. Dick Hinton is club chairman.
