

Arts and Crafts Guild Director Gives Report

A report by Miss Frances E. Johnston, Director, was the feature of the regular monthly meeting of the P. E. I. Arts and Crafts Guild held last night, with Mr. R. H. Rogers as chairman. In her report, Miss Johnston said that arrangements for exhibitions to be held during the balance of the season are well underway. These are a selection of religious paintings from the Reeves Fowkes collection of the National Gallery of Canada in December, Arctic water colours, a group of paintings done in Alaska in January, Canadian Crafts in February, floral paintings by Emily Sarlin in March and the Art Centre Student Exhibition in April. In connection with the Canadian Crafts exhibit in February, Mr. Ellis Roulston, instructor of crafts at Mt. Allison University, will give a talk on Swedish crafts, and will also visit an Island fishing village where he will give a short course on weaving. Miss Johnston reported that the attendance of boys and girls this season exceeds all previous records, with the attendance this year, from October to the first of December, being 1400, compared to a total last year for the same period of some 470. "Many children are just finding out about the Art Centre and are speechless with pleasure when told it is free," she said. "This month we had our first visitor, an amazingly mature young lady of one year and nine months."

Unemployment Higher Than One Year Ago

OTTAWA, Dec. 11 — (CP) — Unemployment in Canada jumped by 37,000 in the first three weeks of November and is nearly 16,000 higher than the comparative period of 1950, the Labor Department reported today. In a review of the employment situation, the department said job applications at National Employment Offices at Nov. 22 totalled 192,900 compared with 155,500 at Nov. 1 and 175,200 at Nov. 23, 1950.

To Supervise New Community Center

All regions and every city except Windsor, Ont., showed increased unemployment. The Atlantic region reported 19,700 applications for jobs compared with 16,900 at Nov. 1; the Quebec region 52,500 compared with 43,200; Ontario region 65,900 compared with 53,800; Prairie region 25,700 compared with 19,200 and the Pacific region 28,400 compared with 22,400. At the same time job vacancies listed at employment offices totalled 46,000, a drop of 25,000 since the peak for the year was reached at the end of September.

Release of seasonal workers from agriculture, construction and fishing, along with "continued" employment reduction in certain sections of manufacturing" is the cause of the slump, the department said.

Pictou Shipyard Workers Strike

HALIFAX, Dec. 11 — (CP) — Operations at a ship repair yard in Pictou were stalled today, the first result of a ruling by the Nova Scotia Labor Relations Board refusing a union certification as bargaining agents because of Communist leadership. About 45 workers at Ferguson Industries Ltd. in Pictou walked off their jobs and set up a picket line. Most of the other men, out of a total of 348, were turned back by the pickets. Company spokesmen said any men not reporting for work tomorrow would be fired. This, however, would not apply to those who tried to return to work but were turned back by pickets.

Accident Claim Barred By Act Of Limitations

The Supreme Court in banco yesterday ruled that the Statute of Limitations barred the claim of A. Mott Stewart against the Maritime Electric Company Limited for injury to his leg while employed by the Company.

The case came before Mr. Justice M. R. MacGuigan as a claim arising out of an accident in October, 1945, in which an electric light pole being right leg crushed the plaintiff's right leg against the defendant's truck. The injury seemed slight but in 1949 infection set in resulting in loss of the use of the leg.

Action was commenced Nov. 28, 1949, and the defendant pleaded among other things that the two-year period of limitation had passed. The trial judge referred the point to the full bench. Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell ruled, Mr. Justice MacGuigan and Tweedy concurring, that the section dealing with "trespass to the person; assault, battery, wounding or other injury to the person whether arising from an unlawful act or from negligence" applied in this case and that the plaintiff's position would be no better if based on breach of contract to take care than, as it properly was, on the tort of negligence.

In case of breach of contract, the cause of action arose on the breach, the failure to take care, and not when injury resulted. Based on tort, the cause of action is one, so that a claim must be for all the resulting damage from the injury. The cause of action consequently arose at the time of the accident and not when the full consequences became known. The action was not brought within two years after the cause of action arose and is therefore barred by the Statute of Limitations, the Court ruled. Counsel for the plaintiff was Mr. D. L. Mathieson, K.C., and for the defendant Mr. E. S. Trainor.
