Physical Fitness In B.C.

Canada's westward province, British Columbia, has endeavored to develop a full-fledged physical education program in its schools in the past three years that has not with extreme success.

"We are aiming at a minimum of three periods a week at each school," says Education Minister Leslie Peterson who outlined the program in 1960 and had it instituted the following year.

Peterson, who keeps himself in trim with daily exercises plus volleyball sessions at the YMCA, says the objective is mass participation. "There used to be too much emphasis on team sports, and reserving of fields and gymnasiums for the top teams to practice. There was not enough mass participation."

"The aim is to produce physically fit children, not star athletes, but with greater physical participation there is bound to be some filtering up to talent."

No single sport is emphasized in the program but encouragement has been given to track and field competitions in conjunction with the Royal Canadian Legion Junior Olympic program.

Two Leaders In Bopsiel Slated For Morning Round

British Columbia's Loyal Dagg faltered Thursday night—bowling 17 in an enigmatic Quebec rink—while the final Richardson from Saskatchewan bopped back into share of the leadership at the Canadian curling championship.

Loyal's foursome appeared to have the lead in the 12th round on ice at the 2,000-seat Chateau Vancouver that was described by some irked competitors as "exceptionally heavy" in the sides.

Ernie Richardson and his family rink from Regina—four-time winners of the round-robin bopsiel and the world title—meanwhile gave New Brunswick a 12-4 mark in the game covering only two hours and 10 minutes.

Both the Richardson and the 34-year-old Dagg head into today's play with 17 records. They will likely decide things. The two rinks will meet in a third spot—draw—British Columbia against Prince Edward Island and Saskatchewan again in the 12th round.

Local Rink Two For Three In Brier Curling Action

Prince Edward Island suffered their third loss against three wins in yesterday morning's Brier draw, falling to Bobby B. Burke in a 6-3 mark in the 12th end.

Burke's rink led 6-5 going into the 12th after picking up two points in the 11th. Skip Burke missed a takeout shot on the fourth-from-last shot of the game, giving Ontario a chance to put a rock in the other side of the house so Burke could not make a double takeout.

Ontario picked up one in the tenth, but could have had two as Mann's final rock failed to make the house. Bobby Dillon came through with a difficult double-takeout in the eleventh to get P.E.I. out of trouble and Burke knocked out Ontario's shot rock with his final stone to count and give P.E.I. a 6-5 lead.

The twelfth end was strictly knock-out until Burke's first shot failed to break, leaving Ontario with the lead. Mann put his first rock in the other side of the house to prevent a double takeout in the eleventh to get P.E.I. out of trouble and Burke knocked out Ontario's shot rock with his final stone to count and stayed in the house to give Ontario the 8-6 win.

Afternoon
The Prince Edward Island curling foursome skipped by Art Burke edged the Newfoundland rink in a match played in the Dominion Brier competition yesterday afternoon at the Charlottetown Forum.

The teams blanked the first end as the Burke rink threw their last stone short of 12 feet. The Newfoundland rink deliberately threw short in order to maintain last rock.

The Newfoundland foursome picked up one in the second when they knocked out Burke's shot rock and stayed to count one. They counted another in the third when Burke's double takeout attempt only took one and rolled out to allow Newfoundland to take a 2-0 lead in the game.

Burke counted three in the fourth end when counting one and two, he delivered the last rock to take a 5-2 lead. Allan Smith's P.E.I. guard shot in the sixth made it two to one for Burke's rink to count one and take a 5-2 lead. Newfoundland knocked out two of Burke's stones and stayed to count one in the seventh.

Newfoundland picked up one in the eighth and the Island counted two in the tenth to give the Islanders a commanding 14-4 lead going into the eleventh end.

The teams were playing a self. Prince Edward Island went on to down Northern Ontario 13-7 and Manitoba and Saskatchewan Nova Scotia 10-4. Quebec 10-7.

Said British Columbia lead Barry Naimark skip of his province's 1959 entry in the curling championship: "We just couldn't find the weight."

Naimark's fatigue was obvious. He swept only on important throws, leaving one member of the rink to handle most of the broom work.

Jack Poltblank skie from Ontario rink upended the Richardson 8-6 in the eighth round, enabling Dagg to sport ahead.

"Fixed it up for you, eh?" Poltblank said with a grin to Dagg when they pulled crossed at an end of the 2-0-200 Charlottetown Forum after their match. Dagg pumped his hand.

He gave Manitoba's Bruce Hudson a 14-4 thrashing in his second match. Thursday's triple-draw, the most strenuous draw of the round-robin bopsiel.

"What do you say after that?" said Dagg, a 36-year-old public relations executive from Vancouver. "They just didn't have it in 'em," he said.

Hudson's highly-regarded four-time winners of five consecutive games' mark the third through seventh rounds.

The top extremity of the standings going into the morning round showed British Columbia at 7-0, Saskatchewan at 6-1, Manitoba at 5-3 and three teams bracketed at 4-3. They were Quebec, Northern Ontario and Alberta.
