

New England Executives Excited by Power Proposals

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Premier Smallwood says a group of executive representatives of New England power companies who saw Hamilton Falls on Sunday were "excited and tremendously impressed."

The executives, representing eight companies who would buy the greater part of the power to be generated at the site of the development and spent 45 minutes circling the Falls on the lower Hamilton river where the second phase of the project would be built.

The group then followed the proposed transmission line across the Cabot Strait to Cape Breton, through Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Maine, New Hampshire and Massachusetts to Boston.

The Newfoundland government is trying to come to agreement with American utility companies who would buy the power after it is delivered to Newfoundland. The route through Newfoundland and the Maritimes was favored by Premier Smallwood although for a time the British Newfoundland Corporation was trying to sell the power to Quebec for transmission through Quebec to New York.

Brinco, a Newfoundland Crown corporation, acts as Newfoundland's agent in the construction and promotion of the Hamilton Falls Power Corporation which is owned partly by Newfoundland and Quebec.

Premier Smallwood has abandoned the idea of taking the power through Quebec even before negotiations between Brinco and Hydro Quebec broke down.

Names of the companies represented on the trip were not known here.

U.S. Seeking New Scientists As Astronauts

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States, apparently spurred by recent Soviet space achievements—is, has decided to start recruiting scientists for training as astronauts.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration said the recruitment process will begin at once. Applications for 10 to 20 men for training as scientists-astronauts will be received until Dec. 31.

NASA currently has a pool of 29 astronauts, including the Project Mercury team members who have had actual sub-orbital and orbital flight experience.

All of the current astronauts were jet pilots primarily. Only since their selection for space missions have they started intensive training in scientific fields.

Some U.S. scientists have opposed this technique on the basis that scientists can conduct the space research that will justify the billions spent on space programs.

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Air Carriers To Co-Operate

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's two international air carriers—Air Canada and Canadian Pacific Airlines—have agreed to channel each other's business on international routes when it is possible.

Privy Council Resident McInnis read to the Commons a statement from the airlines which says they have agreed to "operate first by ensuring each adopts the other's service 'as a first alternative to its own, consistent with customer requirements'."

"That is, if one carrier cannot accommodate a customer due to inconvenient routing or lack of space, it will book him on the other Canadian carrier before any foreign operator, New England. Each will serve as the other's sales agent in the areas it flies to—the privately-owned CPA in many parts of the Orient, the South Pacific and South America, the publicly-owned Air Canada in Bermuda, the Bahamas and the Caribbean Islands. Mr. McInnis said no detailed statement on the inter-airline meetings started at the request of Transport Minister Pickersgill could be issued now, but that additional sales agency appointments are under review.

"The new policy is expected to improve service to passengers and shippers by providing greater Canadian representation in the areas concerned. While aiding both carriers in obtaining additional revenues on international services," the statement concluded.

The Guardian, Charlottetown, Wed. Oct. 21, 1964. Business Credit Remains Problem For Small Firms

OTTAWA (CP)—Despite new private sources of business credit in Canada, small businessmen are still beating a path to the Crown-owned Industrial Development Bank.

The IDB increased the number of customers on its books by 900 to 5,920 during the year ended in August. In the same period its outstanding and authorized loans advanced 13 per cent to a record high \$261,100,000.

Authorities here do not regard the increase in IDB as unusual, considering the economic growth. Bank business has been rising steadily since IDB lending powers were enlarged in 1961.

Moreover, they say this growth in bank business has occurred without overstepping the IDB's role as a lender of the last resort. It lends only when, in his view, the businessman couldn't get funds elsewhere on reasonable terms and conditions.

The IDB expansion is regarded here as evidence a gap still exists in Canadian small-business financing, though it has been narrowed substantially in the last two years by creation of new, specialized financial institutions.

The bank, a subsidiary of the Bank of Canada, has left virtually untouched its 1961 authority to aid small businessmen by investing in their capital stock. This was not proved suitable to either the IDB or most of its borrowers, officials explain.

Most IDB loans are in the \$40,000-\$50,000 range. Businessmen of that size seldom want to give up any control of their operation and rarely can afford a new stock issue. And the IDB abhors the thought of control or anything approaching it.

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal is acquiring a collection of new luxury restaurants and specialty shops as a campaign to preserve its old waterfront section progresses. Warehouses are becoming restaurants, print and book shops and art galleries, and their proprietors are receiving certificates from the city for helping in preservation.

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Czech Reds Give Backing To Nikita

VIENNA (AP)—The Czechoslovak Communist party indicated here it will refuse to participate in any downgrading of Nikita Khrushchev and it wants his alleged bad health and age to be the only official reason for his ouster.

This was similar to positions taken by Poland and Hungary earlier. The East German Politburo also has praised "comrade Khrushchev's merits."

The premium of the Czechoslovak party's central committee said in a statement the Czech party and people learned of Khrushchev's release from his functions "with surprise and emotion."

The statement, distributed by

the Czechoslovak news agency CTK added:

"Our party and our people appreciated the activities of Comrade Khrushchev both with regard to the execution of the general line of the Communist party of the Soviet Union in the struggle to accomplish a policy of peaceful coexistence and the disclosure of the erroneous methods in the period of the cult of the personality.

Dept. Stores Have Business Increase

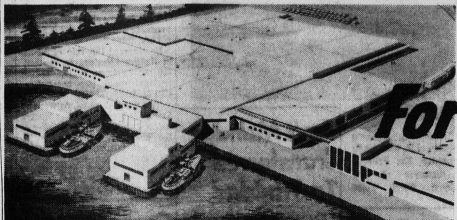
OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian department stores had a September sales volume 10.7 per cent higher than in September last year, the bureau of statistics estimated.
