**Local and Other Items.**

**CANADIAN BACON.**—The indications are this year's exports of Canadian bacon will be the largest on record. Professor Robertson estimates that they will between seven and eight million dollars in value as compared with five millions last year.

**A SNUG YIELD.**—Mr. Benj. McDonald of Cape Breton, Shipegau Island, is in town this week, and is showing a stool of four stocks grown from one oat seed. One of these stocks contains 124 oats, and the other three hold about 300, or about 500 grains in all. He dug 93 bbls of potatoes off three quarters of an acre of land, as can be verified by inquiring of the Light-house Inspector and Mr. Geo. McDonald. The yield averaged 43 to 56 large potatoes to a hill. The ground was a drained swamp manured with refuse from a lobster factory.—Cathlam World.

**KLONDIKE MAMMOTS.**—The frost bound earth of the Klondike contains something more than gold—great mastodons. Alex. Stifford, who has just returned tells a Vancouver reporter that on his claim he found the tusks and bones of mammoths and mastodons. The tusks were ten feet long and seven inches in diameter. A hip bone was also found. It had a socket like a soup tureen. If the behemoths hold out there is no reason why disappointed gold seekers should not bring back the materials for a dime museum and a fortune in their own country.

**SHOULD BE MORE CAREFUL.**—Mr Charles Parker, of Tilsonburg, Ont., was preparing a banquet of white bread and butter, with a seasoning of strychnine, for the rats which infest his house. He was called into another room, and left the feast on the kitchen table. His son, a baby boy just able to walk, had watched the preparation and in his father's absence piled into the bread. Fortunately his father returned immediately, caught the child with his mouth full of poison, and hurried him off to a doctor. An emetic and a stomach pump saved its life, but when the father returned home he found that the boy's pet cocker spaniel had followed his master's example, and was stiffened out under the table. It is safe to say that Mr Parker will not butter bread with strychnine in the kitchen again.

**Christians in Crete.**

**CANEA, Oct. 10.**—The French, Italian and Russian governments have complied with the request of the admirals to send reinforcements to Canea. France sending 800 men, with two heavy guns. This action is taken without waiting for the reply of the Porte to the note of the powers.

The Council of Foreign Admirals has taken the necessary measures to insure the enforcement of the terms of the note presented to the Porte by the representatives of the powers demanding the immediate evacuation of Crete. The presentation of the note and the action of the admirals have caused great rejoicing among the Christian population.

Ismail Bey, Civil Governor of the island of Crete, informed the Mussulman notables that the Sultan will withdraw the Turkish troops from Crete in accordance with the demands of the powers.

**FACTS THAT CONVICT.**

During the great civil war many of the regiments were camped in sothero swamp known to be subject to yellow fever. Many a Louisiana camp was called "camp Death;" or known by some name expressive of its deadly environment.

Few in the present generation can realize the magnitude of that great strife. The total of men in service was 2,772,408. In the hospitals of the army were 6,049,648; of these 425,270 were disabled by wounds, accidents, etc., and 38,115 died of them. The total deaths in hospitals were 186,216; total deaths during the war 304,369; deaths from fevers 43,715; from diarrhoea and dysentery 44,568. The average death per 1000 men per annum was 108.9.

If these figures of death by disease seem shocking by reason of the numbers involved, how much more so might they have been had the same proportion of fatalities occurred as in the late war with Spain. Here, according to the official record, the number who were killed in battle or died of wounds was 316, while 2225 died of disease.

In the civil war out of every 100 deaths 64 were from disease, and the other 36 were killed or died of wounds. In the late Spanish war out of each 100 who died 87 died of disease and only 13 were killed or died of wounds.

Nothing can account for this disparity in the destruction by disease in the two cases, but causes which should make the names of those responsible infamous in the annals of war.—Boston Glob.
