Truman Really Doesn't Like Missouri Waltz NEW YORK (AP) — Former president Truman says he really doesn't like the song Missouri Waltz—his musical trade mark. He's just being loyal to the old home state.

Truman was interviewed a year ago on the Florida Keys by Edward R. Murrow. The hour-long filmed session was seen Sunday on the CBS-TV program, See It Now.

Truman's pithy comments ranged from piano playing to politics and personalities. Asked how the Missouri Waltz became his unofficial theme song, Truman replied: "I hate to go into details on that but the Missouri Waltz was composed by a man from Iowa in 1914 and is called Hushaby My Baby."

"It's a ragtime song and if you let me say what I think—I don't give a damn about it, but I can't say it out loud, because it's the song of Missouri. It's as bad as the Star Spangled Banner so far as music is concerned."

Truman said he started to play the piano when he was about 8 or 9. Like many boys when he was about 16, he said, "I decided that it was a sissy thing to be a piano player and I quit."

"HARD BARGAINER" Capsule comments by Truman on world personalities: Sir Winston Churchill: "One of the most agreeable men I ever met... a hard bargainer." Jawaharlal Nehru, India's leader: "An honest man but he doesn't think down our line very well."

Former Soviet foreign minister V. Molotov: "One of the pig-headedest men that I've ever come in contact with." The late Soviet Premier Stalin: "He made a very agreeable impression upon me (at Potsdam). Of course, I didn't know at that time had no intention of keeping it (agreement)."

Truman said he does not know who originated the phrase "give 'em hell, Harry." "I always told them," he said, "when they would say that to me in a crowd, that I never did give anybody hell. I just told the truth on 'em and they thought it was hell."

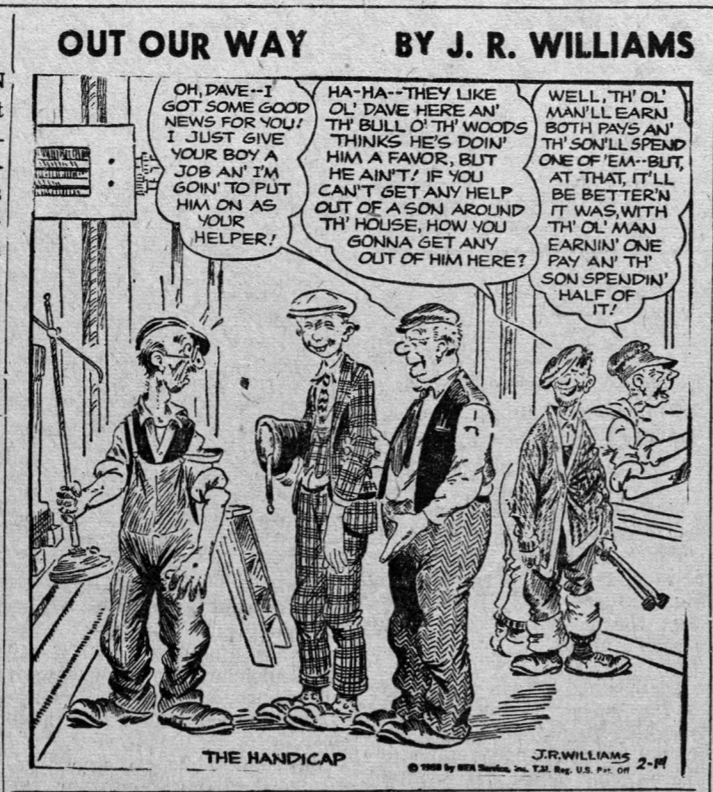

Coal By-Products Provide Greatest Hope Of Industry

By JOHN MOODY PITTSBURGH (AP)—The coal industry and its chemical customers are searching for new and cheaper ways to obtain the by-product coal tars and gases that provide many of modern life's necessities.

American coal chemicals got a commercial foothold during the First World War when imports from Europe were shut off. Today the chemical industry is one of coal's biggest customers.

Most of the coal chemicals used in the U.S. now come from the byproduct ovens that convert coal into coke for use in steel-making blast furnaces. The chemicals are taken off in gas and liquid form.

Consumers get the coal chemicals in forms that range from nylon hose to plastics and from pharmaceuticals to agricultural fertilizer.

SEEK DIRECT METHOD Both the coal and chemical industries are seeking profitable ways to obtain these chemicals in a direct process instead of taking what the coking process discards.

Scientific research has established at least seven sure methods for direct conversion that produce more tars and gases from a ton of coal than the coking process but none has proven commercially economical.

Dr. R. A. Glenn, Bituminous Coal Research Incorporated, chemist, says several of the methods have advanced to the pilot plant stage in the U.S.

The coke oven process is known as the high-temperature carbonization method because of the high heat temperatures involved.

INTERPRETING THE NEWS Greece And Turkey Decline To Compromise On Cyprus

British Foreign Secretary Lloyd undertook his round of conferences with Greece and Turkey in the hope of persuading them to accept a compromise on the future of Cyprus.

Both countries took all-or-nothing positions. The Greeks insisted Cyprus must become part of their country. The Turks demanded partition into Greek and Turkish segments.

Like Prime Ministers Karamanlis of Greece and Menderes of Turkey, Lloyd was under pressure from extremists at home not to make concessions.

LULL TEMPORARY The conciliatory policies of Sir Hugh Foot since he took over from the militant Sir John Harding as governor have diminished terrorist activity on the island.

But there is a growing conviction that the lull will be temporary unless the problem is tackled at its roots.

Menderes and Karamanlis find their hands forced by nationalist opposition parties and politically unfavorable conditions at home. Time has served only to intensify the differences of the contending parties.

BEARDED LLOYD Friell, the gifted cartoonist of London's Evening Standard, sums up the dilemma of Cyprus

With an appropriate portrayal Lloyd captioned by a word adapted from the late Zora Lear: There was an old man with a beard, Who said, "it is just as I feared, "Two Greeks and a priest, "And four Turks at least, "Have all built their nests in my beard."

Lloyd has his own policy thank for the "priest" in his domestic whisks. Britain's adamant refusal to negotiate with Archbishop Makarios, to whom the Greek Cypriots look for leadership, has complicated the issue ever since the island two years ago.

Collect Boners They Have M...

LONDON (CP) — Exports of British boners in relation to Canadian market are being collected by the dollar exporters club as a warning to United States...

Leslie Brown, Canada's commercial councillor in London, told a luncheon meeting of the club that advertising men "boner" list is a result of visit to Britain last year of Canadian trade mission.

Brown told of a well-known British firm whose representative one particular field of Canadian attention from its endeavors. The representative recalled, was particularly impressed when he learned the company was supplying engines for the Scotia fishing boats.

"All the company had to do was tell its story in British Columbia and this Canadian would have jumped at the chance of doing these engines," Brown said.

Since the mission visited Britain in November and December, British queries to Canadian offices in London have increased from about 30 a month to 100 a week.

ISRAELI LODGES PROTEST TEL AVIV (Reuters) — A Wednesday lodged a protest with the United Nations armistice commission against the killing of an Israeli man near the Jordanian border.

The letter quotes Leslie Gahagan, chairman of General Electric Company, who thinks the problem of Britain's small home market may soon be put right.
