WHAT WILL probably be Prince Edward Island's greatest year in the realm of track and field is off to a fly start. In all three counties of the province elementary, junior and senior high schools have been working their training track performers for the past three weeks in anticipation of the big season that lies ahead.

Each spring the school meets get the ball rolling. The success of the summer can usually be measured by the interest in the "run and throw" meets during the school holidays.

County meets will be held in Summerside (Prince), Souris (Kings) and Charlottetown (Queens). County Elementary meets will be Friday, May 29 and the Junior and Senior county competitions, May 30. Provincial champions in all divisions will be declared in Charlottetown, June 6.

Schools will be holding their own eliminations this week-end and next so that they'll have their best ready for the county meets. Each school is limited to two entries each event in the county meet and the first and second place winners in the county meet will qualify for the provincial championships.

The Interscholastic Athletic Association has appointed persons in each area responsible for planning all the various meets. John Hughes, Souris R.H.S. will look after Kings; Charlie Ballam, Summerside H.S. Prince; Dave Rossell, Dept. of Education, Charlottetown; and George O'Donnell, St. James Park, county Elementary meets.
