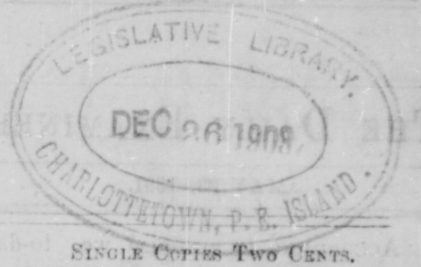

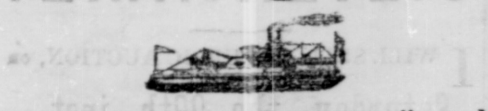

To you, gentlemen, personally, and to my unknown friends on whose behalf you have acted, I have to return my most heartfelt thanks for the exceedingly handsome "Cornet" which accompanied your letter of yesterday, as well as for the expressions of regard, and the good wishes contained therein.

It is indeed, a satisfaction to one who, for over 19 years, has endeavored to the best of his ability (with how much success, it is not for him to say,) to supply to Charlottetown, the music of a Regimental Band, to receive at the hands of its citizens such a tangible proof of their esteem and regard.

During these 19 years, I have had many difficulties to contend with, and much to dispirit me. There was nothing but the love of the art to hold together the members of a Band who, each having to earn his daily bread, would leave whenever better times offered elsewhere. As a consequence, new recruits had to be instructed to fill these vacancies. But, in the midst of it all, I was encouraged by the good citizens of Charlottetown, who twice already in appreciation of my efforts have presented me with valuable Cornets; but this, which I have received at your hands, is the most elaborate one which I have ever seen, and of an exceedingly brilliant tone.

As "Leader of the Band," I feel myself, in all honor and justice, bound to acknowledge the services of Corporal John Werth, who through evil and good report has remained firm.

An Eastern Bismarck has appeared, and his power already rivals that of the German Chancellor. The new leader is General Tso-Tsung-Tang, who is head of the progressive Liberals in China. He has returned from his post in the north-west, where he ruled the people and army with the iron force of Napoleon, to the capital, where he has been appointed Minister of War. He is the leader in the new attempt to manufacture wool without the aid of European labor and machinery. He has imported German operatives to teach the Chinese the mysteries of spinning and weaving with the newest invention of mills. It is he who is directing the anti-opium movement with such tremendous force. No soldier in his service is permitted to use either the Indian opium or the native, which is now being largely raised in the West. It was the same General Tso who prompted the leading points in the late treaties with Russia and the United States. He advocates railways and newspapers, and, following Western example, has established a Government organ.

The sensation of the day, in Annapolis, N. S., is the disappearance of Mr. H. Von Blarcom, Postmaster and Savings Bank Agent at Annapolis. He is represented to have left town on Friday last, entering the woods and then by a circuitous route reaching the coast, where he took passage in a vessel doubtless bound to the adjoining republic. The Savings Bank authorities had an investigation on Saturday, and discovered a deficiency of \$7,000. Mr. Von Blarcom's bonds are for \$1,000. Before departing Mr. Von Blarcom left a note for his wife to be kind to their children.

Mr. Von Blarcom alluded to above is not, we are informed, the gentleman so well and favorably known to the Odd Fellows of this Island.

The Nihilists have answered the manifesto of the Czar by a proclamation saying they accept the war forced upon them and are confident of victory.

Clippings from late Papers.

The British Court of Appeals has decided that deck shipments of cattle are illegal.

The people of the North-West Territories are looking forward with pleasure to the expected visit of H. R. H. the Princess Louise and the Governor General.

Mr. Norquay has introduced in the Manitoba Legislature an Act to establish a system of public schools throughout the province, and the Attorney General has framed a bill to divide the province into judicial districts and to establish courts therein.
