New X-ray Machine Has Been Installed At S'ide

—The installation of a new X-ray machine of the most modern type has just been completed at the Prince County Hospital. This is purely a diagnostic machine as was the previous one but it will produce a better plate and is much more flexible for use. It has two tubes instead of one, as in the old machine, and consequently the output is much increased. One tube is located beneath the table and the other is suspended overhead and travels on a double track in the ceiling and floor. **There are also many advantages** for the operator, one being that the table is motor driven instead of by crank as was the old one. **Dr. Howatt said** that work done in the X-ray department had more than doubled in the past ten years with an average of about 18 patients a day, apart from the work of the tuberculosis clinic which may mean an additional 25 patients when the clinic is in operation. **Cost of the machine** is understood to have been in the vicinity of \$12,000.

B. C. Budget Speech Friday

VICTORIA, (CP)—The Social Credit government of British Columbia, in its third budget, Friday revamped its system of paying for education and announced slight tax reductions. **The budget, calling for expenditure** of \$211,814,314, was read to the third session of the 24th legislature by Premier Bennett in his capacity as finance minister. **It allowed for estimated revenues** of \$194,522,469—leaving a deficit of more than \$17,000,000. However, as the province has an accumulated surplus of more than \$20,000,000 it will still show a bank account of \$3,000,000. **The new education formula** replaces three grants now being paid to municipalities. School finance costs will be paid for the first time through the school districts and not the municipalities. **Under the old formula,** school costs were covered by one-fifth of the province's five-per-cent sales tax, one-third of the motor-vehicle licence fees and direct grants to municipalities. **Now, municipalities will receive** direct assistance on a sliding scale based on population—a system to be reviewed with each federal census.

Continued from page 1 **fall of 1952, he had** been frequently mentioned as eventual head of the 375,000-member Canadian Congress of Labor, Canada's second-largest executive union organization. **Mr. Chappell, born in Winnipeg,** had been living there as western vice-president of the CBRE when he was brought in as national chief in September, 1952, on the resignation of A. R. Mosher, founder of the 46-year-old union with 35,000 members. Mr. Mosher now is honorary president of the CBRE and president of the CCL. **Mr. Chappell's death** leaves the CBRE presidency open to many officers. On Tuesday and Wednesday, following Mr. Chappell's burial here Monday, the nine-man executive will meet to choose a temporary president until the regular triennial convention of the union elects one in September. **Among the best-known of the CBRE's officers** nationally are vice-president Elroy Robson and secretary-treasurer, Scott O'Brien. **Mr. Chappell was** chief negotiator in contract talks with the railways. **Mr. Chappell's death** brought tributes from government and union officers. **Labor Minister Gregg** said he was deeply shocked. The minister called Mr. Chappell one of Canada's outstanding labor leaders who had served as head of the CBRE with distinction. **Mr. Mosher said** the Canadian labor movement has suffered a severe and irreparable loss.

Hennessy,** died—apparently of exhaustion—after fighting the flames which caused \$25,000 damage.

Commons Throne Speech Debate Has Concluded

OTTAWA, (CP)—The Commons throne speech debate ended Friday with formal approval of the government's legislative program and the House turned its attention to study of government bills. **The 16-day debate** was entered by 133 members. At the last session, longest in modern history, the debate lasted 14 days and attracted 119 speakers. **The Commons carried** on division without a recorded vote an address in reply to the speech from the throne, given at the opening of the session Jan. 7. **This came after it** defeated by a vote of 99 to 69 a six-point motion of non-confidence in the government moved by the Progressive Conservatives. **The CCF and Social Credit** groups and Paul E. Gagnon, I.C. (Quebec) voted with the Progressive Conservatives against the Liberal majority. **The vote was light** because many of the chamber's 264 members had left early for a long week-end.

Farm Meeting

—The meeting on Feb. 1st in the B. I. S. Hall at Emerald sponsored by the Emerald Farm Forum, discussed farm problems facing the 40 farmers of the surrounding districts also by officials of the Department of Agriculture from Charlottetown, who braved the bad travelling conditions and below zero temperatures. **Guest speakers** were Mr. S. C. Wright, deputy minister of Agriculture; Mr. I. L. Tuplin, Director of Field Crops; Mr. F. Morris Deacon, Fieldman for Queens County; Dr. G. C. Fisher, Director of Veterinary Services; Dr. R. T. Furness, Kensington; Mr. Herman Wayne being Chairman called on the speakers in the following order. **Mr. Wright** outlined the different policies of his department; the bonus policy on sires for the promotion of better livestock, \$2.50 paid per ton on ground limestone for growing of more and better hay etc. **Mr. Tuplin** spoke on the growing of all rye for spring and fall pasture and the possibility of growing rye for seed; he urged farmers to use only recommended varieties to seed grain adopted to their area. **Mr. Deacon** spoke briefly in reference to the promotion of youth clubs in the community which are sponsored jointly by the Department of Education and the Department of Agriculture, especially in making calls on the advantage of such clubs being the educating of young people in leadership, etc. **Dr. Fisher** gave a very informative talk on diseases of animals principally on Bangs disease of cattle which was the main topic for discussion. To overcome this disease he very strongly urged calvehood vaccination and after blood test the disposal of reactors. **Dr. Furness** asked the co-operation of the farmers which would enable him to give better service, especially in making calls. **The following resolution** was then read to the meeting and unanimously adopted: Whereas there has been an outbreak of Bangs disease in this district and whereas the farmers are subject to a heavy financial loss also to a loss in milk production and in building up a future herd; Be it resolved, That the provincial government implement a policy to aid farmers in the disposal of affected cattle in order to assure immediate clean up of the disease. **A vote of thanks** was moved by Crawford Sinclair and accepted by Cedric Seaman and extended to the speakers by the chairman which was graciously accepted by Dr. Fisher on behalf of the speakers, after which the party from Charlottetown and Dr. Furness went to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Croken for supper before returning to the city.

The demon of fire invaded the precincts of its arch-enemy in Summerside Wednesday morning and smote him hip and thigh right in his own back yard. Thus it got revenge for the many setbacks it had received at the hands and hose of the Summerside Fire Department. Sometimes the very audacity of an act insures its success. This daring foray of the fire god was like sneaking into a courthouse and stealing a watch from the presiding Judge's vest pocket.
