Notes and Comments.

The Illinois Legislature has ordered the payment of a bounty of two cents for the head of every English sparrow delivered over to the State authorities. It will be interesting to see whether the sparrow or the State treasury will cry quits first. The sparrow has great staying powers.

The Florida Legislature has passed a law to make Jefferson Davis' birthday a public holiday. Two months ago the Texas Legislature ordered the taking down of a portrait of George Washington in its halls, and replaced it with one of the leader of the lost cause. As the Montreal Gazette remarks, the South was only physically beaten in the late unpleasantness.

The woman's suffrage bill was, according to the New York Sun, made the subject of merriment by the grave and learned Senate of California. W. H. Williams of San Francisco sent up what purported to be a petition from 500,000 American women, objecting to the enfranchisement of their sex for the following poetic reasons, which Secretary Brandon read in his sonorous tones:

When women's rights have come to stay,
Oh, who will rock the cradle?
When wives are at the polls all day,
Oh, who will rock the cradle?
When Doctor Mamma's making pills,
When Merchant Mamma's selling bills,
Of course 'till cure all woman's ills,

Referring to Sir John Macdonald, the Canadian Gazette of London says: "It was the task, as it was the task of that other great American statesman, Abraham Lincoln, to 'steer a rather shaky raft through the rapids, making fast the unrulier logs as he could snatch opportunity,' and to him, above all others, is it due that Canada to-day enjoys an increasing measure of political and commercial stability. When he first took the helm he found British North America split up into a series of puny and isolated communities, each living its own petty life and spurred on by no ideal of future greatness to lift it from the debasing rut of small things. For a quarter of a century he has labored to change all this, and the united Dominion now sees, with its abounding possibilities and growing national life, is very largely the outcome of his unceasing effort. Lord Durham was a power in Canada when Sir John Macdonald was first grappling with national problems, and he has drawn for us a telling picture of the contrast then presented between the United States and British sides of the frontier line in respect to every sign of productive industry, increasing wealth, and progressive civilization. How different is the spectacle now from Atlantic to Pacific, and though Canada has yet a long road of progress to travel, no candid observer can fail to note the signs of development which Sir John Macdonald and those who have been his colleagues have spared no labor to initiate and encourage. Every method employed to attain this end may not meet with the approval of all. The ways of the politician in young communities is often open to just criticism, but this at least no man can dispute in regard to Sir John Macdonald, that he served Canada as loyally as any man ever served his country, and that he will leave behind him a record to keep his memory green in Canadian hearts long after the petty storms of to-day are passed into the realm of forgotten things.

An Island Trotter Abroad.

At the races held in Worcester, Mass., on June 3rd, the winner of first money of a purse of \$400 in the 2:32 class trotting and pacing, was the roan gelding Telephone. There were seven starters in the race, which was finished in four heats. Telephone won the second, third and fourth, making a reduced record of 2:32 in the third heat. This horse is well-known on this island; he was bred near Cape Traverse, and was sired by Abdallah, Jr., a son of Abdallah Messenger, 4:46, (owned by John O'Ronaghan.) Telephone was once owned by Mr. Pope Clark, of the P. E. I. Railway, who sold him to Mr. McKie, the well-known horse-buyer of this city. Mr. McKie, after purchasing the horse, put him in the hands of Mr. Carroll of Pictou, who worked him for a short time with good results. Mr. McKie entered him in some races and won a good share of the purses. He sold him shortly afterwards to parties in the United States for a handsome figure, netting a good margin on the investment. In 1888 Telephone had a record of 2:36. In 1889 he did not do much on the track; he started in one race in fast company but did not reduce his record. Last year he started in five races, took first money in four, and third in the fifth, making a mark of 2:35 on a half mile track. This was a very respectable showing for an Island bred horse. This year, in his first race, he clips a second off his last year's record. If he keeps on in this manner he will soon be inside the "charmed circle." In 1890 there were only ten animals of Canadian breeding which entered the 2:30 list—eight from Ontario and two from New Brunswick. The fastest of these was the Ontario horse, Avin, 2:14, the fastest trotter ever bred outside the United States.

News Notes.

A strong flow of natural gas has been struck near Warren, Minn.

Over half of the wheat crop in Greer county, Indian territory, has been ruined by the freshets.

In counting \$70,000,000 in the treasury vaults at Washington, a discrepancy of but \$1 was discovered.

The Jewish persecution is extending to all foreigners in Russia, especially to Germans, Poles and Tartars.

The Archbishop of Canterbury has, it is said, been asked to sanction the marriage of Mr. Parnell and Mrs. O'Shea.

It is estimated that \$2,000,000 worth of damage was done to timber in the late forest fires in the Merominee district in Michigan.

The agreement for a closed season in Behring sea was signed yesterday at Washington. The close season extends until May next.

Earth tremors, sometimes of terrifying violence, continue in the Verona (Italy) District, threatening the complete destruction of the town.

Arnold White, Baron Hirsch's agent, has wired the Rothschilds from Kiev that the reports of the wholesale emigration of Russian Jews to England are unfounded.

The illness from which Prince Bismarck is suffering is now said to be rheumatism of the spine. He has been confined to his bed for three days and has been suffering acutely.

It is reported that the Panama Canal project is connected with the schemes of a credit financier syndicate to place the enterprise on a more solid basis to complete the canal.

The Princess of Wales has started a subscription among the wives of army officers for the benefit of Mrs. Grimwood in recognition of her heroic conduct during the recent trouble at Manipur.

A waterspout burst near San Luis Paz, in the state of Guanajuato, on Sunday, the water from which swept away many houses and cattle and unrooted trees. In fact, for a space of three miles, the width of the current, the country was completely devastated. It is not known how many lives have been lost. Hundreds of people are homeless and in a destitute condition.

The laundresses of London, Eng., supported by numerous trade societies, aggregating 80,000 persons, held a demonstration in Hyde Park yesterday. They marched to the music of bands, many of them carrying banners, and they presented a curious spectacle. John Burns and all the ladies' leaders spoke in favor of the work day of eight hours, and Louis Michael harangued the crowd from the socialist platform. It is rumored that a tramway strike is imminent.

PLENTY OF WORK.—Yesterday there were 21 coal laden vessels in port. Five schooners and the steamer Dorcas were lying idle, being unable to obtain men to discharge their cargoes. There is now plenty of work for laborers at the business here.—St. John Gazette.

This song was written for "Reddy and the 400," the racing attraction at Haraigan's theatre, New York. It is being sung and whistled by everyone. It is now id Bowery dives; it is played by theatre orchestras, it is interpolated in all the farce comedies; it is selling by hundreds of copies daily, and now it has reached England. It is hourly expected in Charlottetown.
