Physical Fitness Talks Scheduled

The Atlantic Provinces Physical Education and Recreation Association will hold its annual conference at the YMCA in Charlottetown on Nov. 9 and 10. Approximately 20 delegates from the four provinces are expected to attend. This will be the first time the association has held its annual conference in this province.

Keynote address scheduled for 2 p.m. Nov. 9, will be given by Jack Wilkie, Saskatchewan's director of physical education. Guest speaker at a banquet to be held at Montserrat on Nov. 10 will be Jack Pasmore, professor of physical

education at the Ontario College of Education. Also playing a prominent part in the conference will be Miss Helen Gurney, secondary school supervisor with the physical education division of the Ontario College of Education, who has many years of experience as a physical education teacher.

Provincial director of physical fitness David Bowell said this morning that the conference will deal with all aspects of physical fitness programs, through lectures, seminars and symposiums. Much of the program will deal with school-level physical fitness.

Consultant Appointed in Centennial Planning

The Centennial Committee for 1964 has retained the services of a consultant whose chief work is in planning centennials. He will arrive here next week and will be in charge of special feature events for 1964. The committee has not as yet released the consultant's name.

The next six months will be the crucial period in planning for the 1964 centennial. Committee members meeting Wednesday set at a tentative date of Feb. 1 for the crystallization of plans, with the time after that reserved for final details.

Committee chairman are to meet shortly, and will set a date for a meeting within the next month for a general planning committee meeting.

Water Tests Ordered As Complaints Voiced

Frequently citizens either remark - or complain - that they notice a definite chlorine taste from city water. Particularly, it has been said, if the water is tasted immediately after turning on the faucet.

Authorities find it difficult to account for the condition in view of what is known, both of the quantity of chlorine introduced

into the water supply and the chemical reactions which follow.

The amount used is strictly regulated automatically and is practically impossible for a larger amount to be introduced. But city water authorities stated that even if a much larger amount did go into the water it would make almost no difference whatever.

PROBE ORDERED

City water superintendent Oliver Manuel said yesterday that some recent complaints were being thoroughly investigated and sanitary inspectors of the provincial government department of health were out yesterday making spot tests to determine if it had been in the water a relatively short time. The longer it is in the water the more it distastes.

He stated the chlorine amount used is about 1,000,000 gallons of water. This small quantity he stated was practically dissipated before the water enters the pumping station.

He stated the chlorine almost instantly combines with both organic and inorganic matter in the water and for all practical purposes its presence could be detected only at the immediate faucet if it had been in the water a relatively short time. The longer it is in the water the more it distastes.

SAFETY MARGIN

Dr. Wendell MacDonald, city health officer, said there was no possibility of the amount of chlorine used being injurious to anyone as he noted that there was only one thousandth of the quantity which would be permitted in a sold margin of safety. He also remarked the amount used is less than that used in other cities that employed in other cities in the Maritimes and elsewhere.

Dr. MacDonald also stated from a medical point of view that without the use of chlorine to purify the water the people of Charlottetown might be subjected to many diseases or mild epidemics of a rather serious or inconvenient nature.

He stated that illnesses would be prevalent without the use of chlorine to prevent them as it kills all bacteria and germs in the water safe to drink. He noted that there was a heavy runoff of water from the land into the water supply and this could easily carry multiple bacteria.
