

Silver Jubilee Of Former Island Priest



Rev. Father Adolphus Gillis, Pastor of St. John the Evangelist Parish, Edmonton, will observe the Silver Jubilee of his ordination to the Priesthood on December 8th. Father Gillis was born at St. Peter's, Prince Edward Island, and attended St. Dunstan's University, Charlottetown, from where he graduated in 1926. That same year he went to Edmonton and enrolled in the Theology School at St. Joseph's Seminary. He graduated from this institution in December 1929 and was ordained in his home parish at St. Peter's.

After a year as an assistant he went to St. Columba's, Clantonville, as Pastor. He remained there throughout the depression years but when war broke out he enlisted in the Chaplain Service and served with the Canadian Army for six years. He was with the Engineers in the 3rd Canadian Division during the Western European Campaign.

On being demobilized in 1946, Father Gillis joined the staff of St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, N. S. While there, he did considerable extension work, lecturing to labor and agricultural groups. In 1949, Father Gillis returned to Edmonton and was appointed Pastor of St. John's, Edmonton. During the time he has been at St. John's, the parish has grown rapidly and the present church is much too small to accommodate the congregation. The parish is a well organized unit with a Men's Club, a sub-division of the Catholic Women's League and Sodality of the Children of Mary, as well as a troop of Scouts and Cubs.

COLLEGE FOUNDER URGES RETURN TO "DAYS OF TOWN HOCKEY TEAMS"

EDMONTON (CP) — "Hockey is in a bad way and today creeps hangs over the very name of hockey," says Rev. Athol Murray, famous founder of Notre Dame college at Wilcox, Sask. Father Murray made his comment at a sports dinner at Red Deer, Alta. There isn't one organized senior hockey league on the Prairies. The only two in the West both are in British Columbia, the Okanagan loop and the Western International.

LAST STAND

"Intermediate hockey . . . is hockey's last stand" on the Prairies, Father Murray said. All four western provinces have intermediate teams but there are organized leagues only in Manitoba and Alberta.

In Saskatchewan there is a new intermediate league and in British Columbia plans for the 1954-55 season still are being formulated with expectations there will be teams in the Kootenays and in the Okanagan as well as commercial loops in Vancouver and Victoria.

The two top junior leagues on the Prairies lost charter members this season. Brandon Wheat Kings dropped out of the Manitoba loop, reducing the league to three teams. Calgary Buffaloes left the Western Canada circuit, cutting the league to five teams — Regina Pats, Moose Jaw Canucks, Lethbridge Native Sons and Edmonton Oil Kings.

The other Prairie league is the Saskatchewan which has four teams — Saskatoon Wesleys, Humboldt Indians, Prince Albert Minors and Flin Flon Bombers.

In junior hockey British Columbia never did have a strong contender for the Memorial Cup except one year when the Prairie teams were below par. The coast province's junior outfits include one in the Kootenays and two or three in the Okanagan, all of B calibre and likely candidates for a series next spring with the Alberta Junior B champions.

MANY MINOR TEAMS

In minor divisions, there are numerous teams all across the West, even in British Columbia. Last year there were 208 midget, juvenile and pee-wee teams operating.

CANADA'S NEW MAP OF THE WORLD NOW IS READY FOR DISTRIBUTION

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's new map of the world, two years in the making, now is ready for distribution. "As maps go it's attractive, but nothing to rave about," says E. D. Baldoek, chief federal cartographer. "As far as we were concerned it was just a job that we worked on when there was time." They worked on it at different periods, because the surveys and mapping branch of the mines department gives top priority to maps of Canada. This is the first world map done by the Canadian government branch in 16 years, and in an interview Mr. Baldoek confessed it involved a great deal of frustration. **OLD PLATES USELESS** Plates used to print the last world map published by Canada were politically out of date, and anyway they were worn out because they had been used to print 100,000

copies. Then, conditions after the Second World War were chaotic from a cartographer's viewpoint as boundaries were being changed and countries were acquiring new status. So instead of revamping the pre-war drawings it was decided to start fresh on a design measuring 45 by 25 inches. **COLORING PROBLEM** One big problem was the application of 53 tints on the color map, which shows sea trade routes and Canadian diplomatic posts abroad. The Iron Curtain countries are tinted yellow. The map shows the 38th parallel partition between North and South Korea and the three boundaries of

the Indochina states of Laos, Cambodia and Viet Nam. Closer to home, Canada is shown with such recent geographic details as the railroad leading to the Knob lake iron ore centre in northern Quebec, the aluminum city at Kitimat, B. C., Baker lake, Uranium city and other mining centres in the Canadian North.

PROVINCE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND NOTICE TO POTATO GROWERS

WITH RESPECT TO VOTER QUALIFICATIONS FOR POTATO MARKETING PLEBISCITE NOVEMBER 10, 1954

In order that misunderstanding and confusion be kept to a minimum on voting day the following information is released for the assistance of Deputy Returning Officers and Agents and for the information of voters.

The Federation of Agriculture have appointed their official agents who have been requested to act in an impartial manner to the end that all qualified, but no others may have the opportunity of voting.

General qualifications: (Canadian citizens)

1. Voters must be (British subjects).
2. Voters must have attained their 18th birthday on or before November 10, 1954.
3. The growing of one acre of potatoes in 1954 on land either owned or rented or placed at the disposal of a voter by a parent for the growing of potatoes is a necessary qualification.
4. Women who are growers in their own right and meet other qualifications are eligible.
5. A wife is not eligible to vote on her husband's qualifications.
6. A voter may vote in only one poll which must be the poll in which he or she resides.
7. In no case may two persons vote on one acre of potatoes nor three persons vote on two acres and so on.
8. Before receiving a ballot all voters will be required to sign a declaration which will have the same force and effect as if made under oath.
9. Penalties are provided for the signing of a false declaration.
10. Polls will remain open from 1:00 P. M. Wednesday, November 10th, until 9:00 p.m. the same day.
