MASSSES OF LIVELY ATOMS.
Diamonds Are Composed of Myriads of
Molecules in Continuous Motion.
Sir P. Ball, who is fond of revealing the
mysteries of the atom, has been studying the
action of molecules, and what he has to say
concerning the movements of the molecules
of a diamond is as truly surprising as any-
thing he has told us about the sun and the
planets. Every body is composed of a
multitude of extremely, but not infinitely,
small molecules, and it might be thought,
says Sir Robert, according to a contributor
in the Newcastle Chronicle, that in a
solid, at all events, the little particles
must be clustered together in a compact
mass. But this is far more wonder-
ful. Were the sensibility of our eyes in-
creased so as to make them a few million
times more powerful than they are, we should
be able to see the diamond atoms which form
the perfect gem when aggregated in sufficient
myriads are such in a condition of rapid
movement, the most complex description.
Each molecule would be seen swing-
ing to and fro with the utmost violence
among the neighboring molecules, and
quitting from not shooting its motion
encounters with other molecules, which
occur millions of times in each second.
The hardness and impenetrability; so
characteristic of a diamond, is due to the
refute the supposition that it is a mere
cluster of rapidly moving particles; but
the well known impenetrability of the
gem arises from the fact that when an
attempt is made to press a point into the
stone, it falls because the rapidly moving
molecules of the stone batter the metal
with such extraordinary violence that they
refuse to allow it to penetrate or even
to mark the crystallized surface. When
glass is cut with a diamond the edge which
seems so hard is composed of rapidly
moving atoms. The glass which is cut is
an merely a mass of moving molecules,
and what seems to happen is that as the
diamond is pressed against the glass, the
particles, by their superior vigor, drive the
little particles of glass out of the way.

QUEBEC, June 3.—There has been con-
siderable discussion in this city, both

sessed by the Assessors of the said City in the

3rd. The amount of Poll Tax to be paid by
every person returned by the said Assessors
in the said General Assessment Book and Val-
uation Roll as liable thereto for each Water-
works Fund under said Statute, for the year
commencing the first day of January, A. D.
1895, and ending the first day of December, A. D.
