Spending For - In the current fiscal year, there have been \$29,126,000 in supplementary estimates to date. The main estimates for this year, tabled in the Commons, about a year ago, totalled \$4,404,340,000. In reaching the total \$58,000,000 increase in this year's estimates - which largely will form the basis for the coming budget that sets taxes - the government announced a chopping of \$126,000,000 in various forms of defence spending against an increase of \$184,000,000 in non-defence operations. The cut reflects reductions in stockpiling of materials and a slowdown in construction because military works are catching up to designated requirements. Apart from direct defence spending, the government also is planning to cut down its outlays during the coming year on defence production and slightly - on civil defence.

Main Increases - There were these increases as non-defence spending went to \$2,537,000,000 from the \$2,353,000,000 of the current year. Public debt charges \$43,000,000; civil service pay increases, \$27,000,000; tax rental payments to the provinces, \$22,000,000; additional contribution to the civil service superannuation fund, \$22,000,000; family allowances, \$17,000,000. Two others were these: 1. To the CBC, an additional \$15,000,000 passing through the government's hands in a special tax on the sale of receiving sets to replace the former set licence collected directly by the CBC. 2. A treasury subsidy of \$7,000,000 a year to the railways to enable them to lower freight rates on traffic between eastern and western Canada. Only departments in which forecast spending is down are fisheries, justice, state secretary and veterans.

For payments to provinces under tax rental agreements, the government is asking for \$322,500,000. The payments go to all provinces except Quebec, yet to sign an agreement with the central government. Biggest boost of the \$22,000,000 additional - \$9,000,000 - is to go to Ontario.

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C N R Official On Retirement Leave



Mr. C. J. MacLean, (above) veteran official of the Canadian National Railways, goes on leave today, prior to his retirement from the service which becomes effective on February 18th.

Mr. MacLean entered the service of the Railway in 1912 and was appointed a car repairer in 1915. Three years later he was made car foreman and on February 15th, 1926 he was appointed Divisional foreman, the position which he holds at his retirement. As Divisional foreman Mr. MacLean was responsible for the car staffs at Borden and Summerside and for the passenger and freight cars in Charlottetown as well as the car shop in this City. A public spirited man, Mr. MacLean has ever been interested in community welfare and has consistently acted as C.N.R. divisional commander in such drives as the Cancer Fund, the Salvation Army and the Canadian Red Cross Society. An ardent curler and golfer, Cleaver, has not made definite plans for his retirement but since he enjoys good health some of his activities will no doubt center around the two clubs of which he is a member. In the summer months he will take up one of his favorite hobbies of gardening at his summer home in the country. Mr. MacLean's successor will be Mr. W. A. Livingstone who entered the service in 1924 and has been steadily promoted since that time. He will be succeeded as assistant foreman by Mr. D. W. MacKenzie, who previous to coming with the car department in 1941 was employed with the Maintenance of way department as an acetylene welder.

Dowling, knowing only the first name of the former hairdresser, was able, with the help of one of the ladies in the profession, to find out where the missing lady might be staying in town. Upon dialing the number, great was the relief of all concerned when the car owner answered the phone and the two parties were reunited. Incidentally the others were just as worried about the whereabouts of their friends but strange to say never thought of contacting the police.

Exporters Not - Continued from page 1 - the guaranteed price and passed along the information to the U. S. government, the official said. Shipments End In Washington, Treasury Secretary Humphrey advised Maine congressmen that "competent Canadian authorities" have given assurance that low-price shipments of potatoes from the United States and New Brunswick have just about ended. Humphrey, in a letter made public by Maine Senators Margaret Chase Smith and Frederick Payne, said that since Jan. 28 the only Canadian potatoes coming in have been a small amount contracted for before that date. In a letter to Humphrey last Dec. 29, Payne said he was informed that "marketing arrangements" had been made in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island under which the Canadian government would guarantee potato producers \$1.10 a barrel from Dec. 24 through Dec. 31 and \$1.25 thereafter. Humphrey said in his reply Friday: "Assurances have been received from the competent Canadian authorities that after midnight, Jan. 28, 1954, no shipments have been made or will be made to the U.S. custom territory of potatoes marketed by the pools in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick support prices plus handling charges, except for shipments totalling approximately 85,000 one hundred pound bags principally seed potatoes under purchase
