It must be Policy time again.

Presentations started today in 237 Kelley Building, and before 4:15 tomorrow, 19 groups of four students each will stand before the judges and have their projects evaluated.

Business 492, Management Policy, is a required course for all graduating Business Administration students, and basically consists of a major research project in which groups of students pick and establish an imaginary small business firm.

At the end of the term they present a report of their operation to a board of judges, this year including all

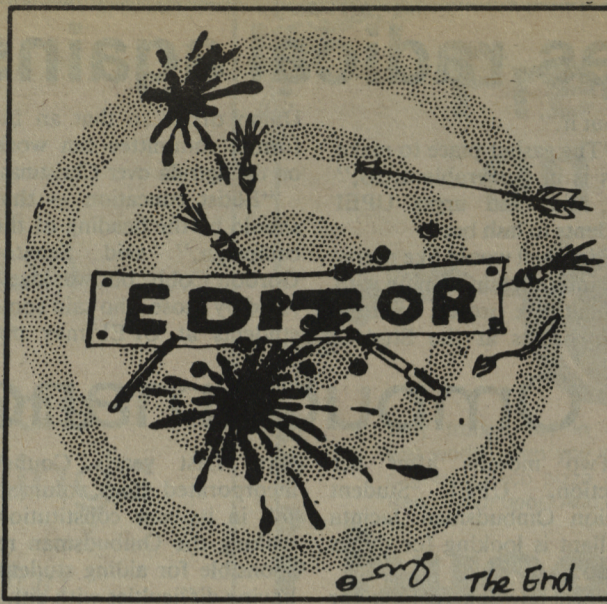
four Business profs co-ordinating the program, Douglas Cameron from the provincial Department of Industry, and Nelson Hagerman from the chartered accountant firm of Hagerman and Baker.

The presentation is worth 100% of the course, and the judges will pick the three best projects and award prizes of \$500, \$300, and \$200 per group.

Every group will receive \$200 to help allay expenses as well, through provincial government funding assistance, though School of Business Director J. J. Revell says many spend more than that during the term.

"It's a lot of work, but most of our students think it's an important capstone to
