Incidents of the Crisis.

The New York World thus comments on an incident in the events of Black Wednesday:—"There was a lively run on the second national bank, but the doors were not closed. This bank had a wealthy father. The president, young James O. Eno, squandered in the neighborhood of \$4,000,000 in wild speculations. The bank was in a tight place. Not one of the eminently respectable, but highly solvent and ornamental directors knew that the funds of the bank were being misdirected until the denouement came. It had been going on for months and the directors met and nosed the books and papers every day. When the inevitable hour arrived, Amos R. Eno, father of the president, amiably handed over \$3,500,000 for the relief of the bank and the directors raised another half million. Eno pere is worth \$20,000,000, and he sat in the bank and told the excited depositors to come on. He said he was good for a million a day for something like a fortnight. This Roman father performance saved the bank, but what is to be said of the directors and other officials of the institution who slept while the president gambled away the deposits of the trustful customers?"

High Pressure in the Schools.

In an article in the Fortnightly Review, Earl De La Warr dwells at some length upon the crying evil of high pressure in the schools. He shows from a mass of medical and other evidence that it is unjust to scholars and teachers. A strange feature of the case he makes out, however, is that relating to the children of the miserably poor. Statistics seem to have been compiled—and they have a cold-blooded look—which prove that in certain districts in London forty per cent. of the children come to school sometimes without breakfast, and twenty-eight per cent. sometimes without dinner. Earl De La Warr puts the case lightly when he says that educational overpressure in such cases amounts almost to a crime.

A Wonderful Pacer.

Wm. Sargeant, of Goshen N. Y., one of the first trainers and drivers of St. Julien, has in his charge a pacing wonder. He is a bay gelding named Mac, raised by Joseph Smith of Sugar Loaf, N. Y., and sired by Florida, dam an Abdallah Clay mare. He is thought to be the fastest pacer in the country. He will be eight years old in June next, stands 15 hands 3 inches high, has

flowing mane and tail, and is well proportioned. At a trial last week he is said to have paced over the track a quarter in 32 1/2 seconds. This is a half mile track, and 32 1/2 is equivalent to 30 or better over a mile track. "Billy" Sargeant is satisfied that he can pace over a better track in 20 seconds, and he believes he can beat any pacer in America. It is his intention to enter him in the grand Circuit.

About Earthquakes.

The number of shocks in an earthquake varies indefinitely, as does the length of intervals between them. Sometimes the whole earthquake only lasts a few seconds. Thus, the city of Caracas was destroyed in about half a minute, 10,000 lives being lost in that time. Lisbon was overthrown in five or six minutes; but a succession of shocks may continue for hours, days, weeks, or months. The Calabrian earthquake, which began in February, 1783, lasted through a continued series of shocks for nearly four years, until the end of 1786. The area shaken by an earthquake varies with the intensity of the shock from a mere local tract, where a slight trembling has been experienced, up to such catastrophes as that of Lisbon, which convulsed not only the Portuguese coasts, but extended into Iceland on the one hand and into Africa on the other, agitated lakes, rivers, and springs in Great Britain, and caused Loch Lomond to rise and to subside with startling suddenness.
