

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

AN AGED PRISONER.—Jane Richardson, an inmate of the county jail, died on Monday last, aged 110 years. She belonged to Arden, Ontario.

CONFIRMATION.—His Lordship Bishop Macdonald administered the Sacrament of Confirmation to eighty six persons in Sacred Heart Church, Alberton, on Sunday morning last.

GOODLY RECEIPTS.—The net receipts of the Methodist tea at Summerside, on Thursday were a little over \$500, including the collection taken during the laying of the corner stone of the new church, which amounted to \$75.25.

The cashier used the cheque to make good a shortage at the factory. The missing man is an Englishman, and recently married a Halifax lady.

BEATS THE RECORD.—A terrific hail storm passed over North-eastern Manitoba last week. It is stated that one of the hailstones was driven clean through the clapboard covering of the railway station at Arden. A machine agent there was struck on the head by several hailstones and his scalp so badly cut that the doctor had to put thirteen stitches in it. Two Indians in the same vicinity were knocked insensible.

DISORDERLY CONDUCT.—There was a drunken row on Lower Queen street yesterday afternoon, and a similar disturbance occurred on Richmond street the previous evening. On Tuesday night when the Worcester was coming up to her dock several young men began fighting and acting in a disorderly manner on the wharf. Such disgraceful conduct should not be tolerated, and it is hoped that the authorities will be slow to search out and punish the guilty persons.

DIED FROM HER INJURIES.—Mrs. Blanchard, of Etobicoke Township, Ont., was visiting her mother, Mrs. Holt, Coulter, of the same district on Sunday. In the evening, going to the cellar to fetch some milk with a lamp in her hand, she slipped. The lamp exploded and set fire to her clothing. She was frightfully burned before the flames could be extinguished. She suffered terrible agony all night and all next day, and died that night. Mrs. Blanchard was the wife of a Congressional minister.

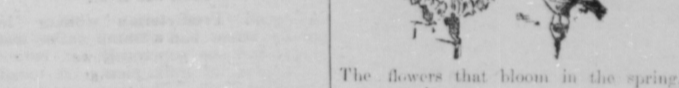
