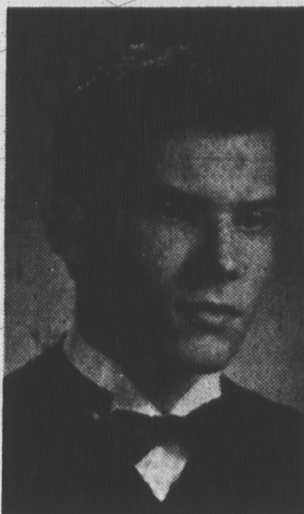


U.C. Student Minister Named For Cavendish

Amis Turn Christian

"You don't know me," the young Amis elder said to the translator, "but I remember each of your three visits to my village. The first time you came, there were no Christians. Now we have had a church for several years.

"I watched you that first day as you asked the names of cabbage, potatoes and other things. Later I heard you pray. Somehow I knew that your way was the right way, and three weeks later I accepted Jesus and became a Christian."

The Amis are the largest aboriginal tribe in Taiwan, 20,000 of the 90,000 claiming to be Christian. No Scriptures were available in that language 10 years ago. Team missionary Edward Torjesen and his national colleagues set to work and by 1958 the language was reduced to writing.

Translation began on the books of James and Mark. An Amis elder sat listening to the Epistle of James for the first time, his face aglow.

"To listen to these words," he said, "is just like having a harpoon go through your heart. We Amis Christians still do not know much about God, and our language has never before been used to express things like these. Yes, it was just as if a harpoon went through my heart."

Downfall Comes To A King

The 36-year period between the death of Jeroboam and the ascension of Ahab to the throne of Israel was one of violence and confusion.

Jeroboam was followed by a weak son, Nadab, who was succeeded by a violent revolutionary leader named Baasha. Elah, son of Baasha, was slain in a drunken debauch by one of his own commanders, and all the members of his family exterminated. Zimri, another leader of rebellion, reigned only seven days. Omri, strong, purposeful, but cruel in the methods he employed, reigned for 11 years.

Then came the weak Ahab, son of Omri, with whose character and moral weaknesses today's lesson deals.

Ahab was despicable in every aspect of life. His evils were exceeded only by his weakness. As fate would have it, he married the Sidonian princess Jezebel, a woman as strong as he was weak. Jezebel hated Jehovah worship—browbeating her milkop husband into doing whatever she wanted him to do, and carving out a career of violence that ended in tragedy for both of them.

Though relatively few verses of the Bible are concerned with Jezebel, so great is her reputation for evil that her name has become a common noun, synonymous with a "wicked woman." Not only did she reintroduce Baal worship into Israel, she stirred her husband to all

the despotism and cruelty of the average Oriental monarch of the era. She banished the prophets of the local shrines. When Elijah discredited and destroyed her prophets, she threatened his life but the prophet eluded her and escaped to Judah.

With such a background, the incident of Naboth's vineyard would be trivial were it not for the appearance of Elijah.

The humble Naboth possessed a vineyard, an old family property beside the king's palace. Ahab wanted it for an herb garden, offering a better vineyard or cash for the property. Naboth refused for sentimental reasons and also on the valid grounds that the Mosaic Law forbade it.

What was Ahab's reaction? He behaved like a small child. He sulked and became petulant. He took to his bed, turned his face to the wall and refused to eat.

Jezebel became scornful and contemptuous. "Are you king of Israel or is Naboth?" she asks. "If you are king, get out of bed and act like one! I will give you the vineyard of Naboth!"

And this she did, promptly and violently. In Ahab's name, and using his seal, she sent letters to the nobles and elders of Naboth's village. Proclaim a feast, she said. Set Naboth on high among the people. Seek out false witnesses to accuse him of blasphemy against God and disloyalty to his king. Then carry him out and stone him to death.

The scheme worked. Naboth was murdered. His vineyard came into Ahab's possession. Now God commanded Elijah, who had so overwhelmingly brought disaster to the priests of Baal (I Kings 18:17-40), to confront the king and rebuke him for his evil deed.

It would be hard to find two persons in greater character and moral contrast than Ahab and Elijah at the confrontation in the vineyard. Elijah called down the wrath of God upon Ahab, promising him that where the dogs licked the blood of Naboth they would also lick the king's blood; that his posterity would be cut off, his dynasty would die, and concerning his wife, the dogs would devour her.

Lesage Praises Alberta House At Ceremonies

MONTREAL (CP)—Premier Jean Lesage here at the opening of Alberta House in Montreal that it will provide "the possibility of collaboration and better relations which were, until today, absent."

He said: "Our people will apply to your bureau for information about Alberta, thanks to this same bureau, Albertans will be in a better position than ever before to learn about Quebec. "Perhaps, and this is to be hoped, tourism in both directions will be stimulated."

The premier said he is convinced provincial houses are an efficient means of bettering inter-provincial relations and, for this reason, Quebec is following Alberta's example and setting up Quebec houses across Canada. The first of these will be constructed at Toronto.

Mr. Lesage said Alberta and Quebec are physically far away from one another and different in many respects. "But the establishment of Alberta House would serve as a step toward the solution to any problems that might exist between the two provinces."

Mr. Lesage said Alberta House would help Quebec manufacturers "to inform themselves about the possibilities available in Alberta from the economic and commercial point of view."

Time Runs Out For Water Plant

OTTAWA (CP)—Atomic Energy of Canada Limited will have to look elsewhere for heavy water if Deuterium of Canada is unable to arrange financing shortly for expansion of its Glace Bay, N.S. plant, J. L. Gray, AECOL president, said here.

Mr. Gray said in an interview that "everything is set on a deal for the Crown corporation to take more heavy water from Deuterium except the financing for plant expansion necessary to produce it."

"Before long we will have to look elsewhere, Mr. Gray said. At the same time, the Crown corporation did not want to push Deuterium too hard.

Atomic Energy of Canada has been authorized to enter into a contract with Deuterium for the purchase of 5,000 tons of heavy water for use in nuclear power plants. The heavy water would be supplied over a 12-year period.

The proposed contract, bogged on financing, would be similar to one signed earlier with Canadian General Electric which plans to build a plant to fill it. Canadian General Electric must choose a site by June 15 for its plant.

Bonny Refit Cost Quoted

OTTAWA (CP)—It will cost about \$8,000,000 to refit the aircraft carrier Bonaventure, Industry Minister Drury told the Commons.

He said a \$4,913,541 contract has been awarded to Davie Shipbuilding Ltd. of Levis, Que., for the overhaul that will take place in the next year.

This firm-price contract, for work on specifications prepared in advance, was "one of three elements" in refitting the Halifax-based carrier.

The defense production department would spend an estimated \$2,230,000 on stores and equipment like radar and air conditioning, to be installed by Davie.

A further \$855,000 probably would be spent on a unit-price basis for unpredictable needs, he said.

Minister Opens Road

HALIFAX (CP)—Highways minister P. Y. Keenan announced that Trunk Highway No. 4 from Truro to the Nova Scotia-New Brunswick border will be raised to summer axle weights, effective Friday.

He said the restrictions would be lifted on No. 4 from Truro by way of Glenholm, Wentworth, Oxford, Springhill, Amherst and to the border. Mr. Keenan said side roads off No. 4 would remain restricted.

FRANCE GETS TV AWARD

MONTREUX (AP)—France was declared winner of the sixth world television festival Friday and awarded the Swiss "golden rose of Montreux" trophy. The French entry was L'Arroseur Arrose—literally translated The Sprinkler Sprinkler, produced and directed by Pierre Tchernia. The "silver rose" trophy went to the United States with The Julie Andrews Show. Switzerland took the "bronze rose" with the Bernard Show, starring Swiss comedian Bernard Haller.

600-MILE WALK PLANNED WITHOUT TAKING FOOD

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich. (AP)—Jaunty, 66-year-old Marion Pearson set off from Canada Wednesday with four companions to walk 600 miles without eating a bite of food.

The five—a hole of others range in age from 45 to 68—began a long hike to Richmond, Ind., in an attempt to show that a man can walk a long time and distance without having to eat.

Pearson, Grand Rapids businesswoman with a reputation as a "super walker" because of previous long treks on foot, led the group from the starting point on the Canadian side of the International Bridge.

A 40-mile-an-hour wind blew in freezing temperatures but none of the hikers seemed to mind.

Pearson said he has found his desire for food wanes after about the third day of walking. He predicted he will lose about one pound a day on the trip.

Stepping along with Pearson are fellow Grand Rapids businessman Fred Lavene, 68; city commissioner Earl Robinson, 66, of Wyoming; a Grand Rapids suburb; Wyoming's Lions Club president, Duane Smith, 54, and Conrad Vanhove, 45, a Zeeland mail carrier.

Smith said if Pearson lasts the full 600 miles it will surpass a 1927 trek by a Chicago man who walked 567 miles without food to Bald Knob, Pa.

Pearson, in recent years, has celebrated each birthday, May 8, with a 100-mile hike.

Traders Finance Earnings Down

TORONTO (CP)—R. M. Willmott, president, says earnings of Traders Finance Corp. Ltd. will be lower in the first half of 1966 than in the corresponding 1965 period.

He told the annual meeting here that the decline would be caused by the prevailing tight money market and higher interest rates arising from it.

Mr. Willmott said Traders will "very shortly have 100-per-cent liquidity covering of short-term borrowings through cash, investments and bank lines of credit."
