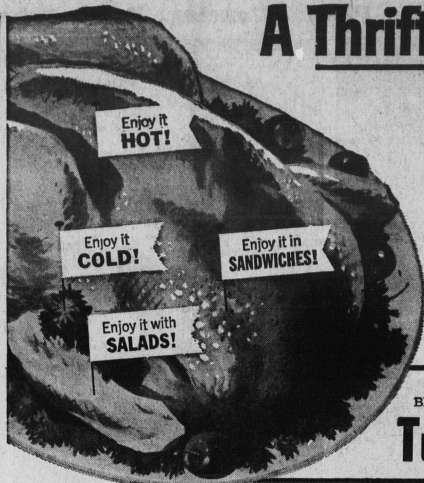

22 Cases Heard At Georgetown

MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
More than 20 cases were dealt with by Magistrate James Johnston, QC, at Georgetown yesterday. Charles R. McQuaid represented the Crown in all cases.

David Francis Horton, Peters Road, was fined \$75 and costs or 30 days on a charge of leaving the scene of an accident.

Arthur Joseph Gallant, Georgetown, charged with breaking and entering was represented by S. S. Hessian, QC. He was sentenced to three months in the Kings County Jail, with a strong warning from the magistrate to not re-appear before him on a similar charge or the sentence would be much more severe.

A charge of assault against James Bruce Cookin, East Baltic, was withdrawn and John Thomas Creed, Sturgeon, had an assault charge against him adjourned for two weeks to Aug. 8.

Two men charged with being intoxicated in a public place were each fined \$20 and costs or 15 days. For possession of liquor in a place other than residence, two others were each fined \$20 and costs.

Illegal possession of liquor cost Clarence R. Murphy, Beaton Mills, \$25 and costs or 20 days.

Joseph Gladstone Vanzo, Val-des-Isles, represented by Mr. Hessian was charged with unlawful and indecent assault. His case was adjourned to Aug. 15.

TROUT CONFISCATED

Austin Steeves Served in P.E.I.

MONCTON — One of the best known policemen in the Maritime Provinces retired here Wednesday and allowed he would spend his days following quieter pursuits of gardening and gravel.

Austin F. Steeves, regional superintendent of investigation for the Canadian National Railway, began his career as a policeman with the Moncton City police as a constable 46 years ago.

Since that time he has acquired several theories and ideas about police work that are well-known, if not entirely agreed to by his associates.

He maintains that the average citizen often has an unreasonable fear of the police, and consequently does not understand the officer's position and role in society.

"The policeman is actually the best friend the public has, and there ought to be greater understanding and co-operation between the two," Mr. Steeves' service included period in P.E.I.

HELINSKI (Reuters) — Police used tear gas Tuesday night to disperse crowds demonstrating against the Communist-backed World Youth Festival meeting here.

Police lobbed a tear gas grenade into a mob outside the Hotel Maraki at 11:30 p.m. after the crowd began to shout and huge firecrackers were thrown.

It was the second consecutive night that Helsinki's police resorted to tear gas to break up crowds who have been demonstrating sporadically since the youth festival opened last week-end.

Earlier today the Soviet armed forces newspaper Red Star declared that a "so-called American tourist active in organizing provocations" during the 1960 Rome Olympic Games was in Helsinki.
