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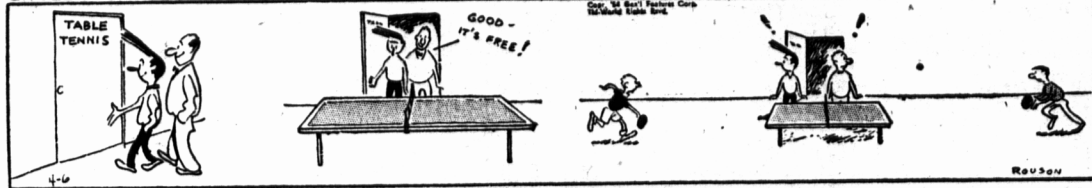

Red Wings' Coach May Stand Pat On His Lineup

DETROIT, (CP)—Far away from the backslappers, ticket moochers and the omnipresent hometown worshippers of hockey idols, Detroit Red Wings rested Monday in their hideout in Toledo, 60 miles from Detroit.

The little news that came out of the camp indicated that coach Tommy Ivan would make little or no change with the squad that convincingly whipped Montreal Canadiens 3-1 Sunday night in the opening game of the best-of-seven Stanley Cup final.

Ivan had good reason to stand pat. His big first line dominated the offensive display shown by any trio on either team.

Meanwhile, talk persisted there might be a shake-up in the Montreal line-up before tonight when the Wings make their second stand on home ice before the series shifts to Montreal for Thursday and Saturday games.

Coach Dick Irvin kept his counsel but there were whispers he might divulge something well before game time today.

Lach May Play

One report had it that veteran centre Elmer Lach would be used for the first time in the post-season play-off. He was not even dressed for the semi-finals with Boston, which Canadiens took in four straight.

The gossip had it that Lach would go back to his old job on the first line—or punch line—to take over from Ken Modell.

There were also rumors that Bert Oldstead might be shifted to another line and Eddie Mazur moved up to replace him at left wing, with Rocket Richard remaining on right wing.

It wasn't so much the comparatively inept performance of the punch line last night that worried Irvin. It was the fact that not one of the trio has got himself so much as an assist in five playoff games.

Where Detroit's production line of Gordie Howe, Ten Lindsay and Alex Delvecchio stood out Sunday night, along with Earl Reibel on power plays, Montreal's first line collectively was the goat of the game.

Detroit also packs powerful defensive strength in the line of Glen Skov, Marty Pavlich and little Tony Lawick. It was this line that looked after the Montreal trio of Jean Beliveau, Dickie Moore and Boom Boom Geoffrion.
