Executives In Quebec Are Now Highest Paid

TORONTO (CP) - If you're an ambitious young man who wants to be an executive go to Quebec.

A survey by the Toronto management consulting firm of H. V. Chapman and Associates Ltd. shows that Quebec executive salaries have risen a spectacular 39.6 per cent since 1961, more than anywhere else in Canada. They now are the highest in the country—13.6 per cent above the national average.

As a Quebec executive you can expect to make an average of \$16,750 a year. Furthermore you have a good chance—29 in 100—to make more than \$20,000.

The survey doesn't list the qualifications for a Quebec executive. Bilingualism is an obvious asset.

But you can make it to the top of the corporate ladder by the age of 45.2—if you have been with your firm 14.6 years and in your present job 6.4 years.

The next best place to be a company man is in the Pacific region. There you'll make an average \$15,000 annually, 1.7 per cent above the national executive average.

AGE HELPS
And you'll make it younger. The survey shows West Coast executives are the youngest in Canada, averaging 45 years, compared with a national average age of 47.1. They reach the top in B.C. after only 11.6 years with their companies, faster than anywhere else.

In Ontario the average executive makes \$14,350 after 18.2 years with his company. On the Prairies he makes \$14,250 after 16.7 years when he's 47.8 years old.

The poorest paying region for executives is the Maritimes, where they earned an average \$12,900 last year, stayed with their companies 18.5 years to do it and were older, at 49.5 years.

FARMERS UNION IN QUEBEC HITS FEDERAL MP'S INACTION

BEAUFORT, Que. (CP)—The Quebec Catholic Farmers' Union has accused the province's federal members of Parliament from all parties of inaction on questions affecting agriculture.

Some 500 delegates attending the union's 42nd annual congress in this Quebec City suburb passed a resolution calling their parliamentary representatives poor spokesmen for Quebec's farmers.

The MPs were condemned for their "lack of knowledge about agricultural problems, their political immaturity, their political opportunism during elections and their general carelessness and indolence."

The delegates also reproached the MPs for not carrying out electoral promises once they had been elected.

The Quebec members had not shown sufficient vigor in backing legislative measures calling for establishment of a grain-regulating agency in the eastern provinces and for establishment of a minimum price of \$4.00 for each 100 pounds of milk bought from farmers.

WOULD INSTRUCT MP'S
The delegates suggested that the union make greater efforts to instruct MPs about agricultural problems and solutions demanded by farmers.

Pressure should be brought upon the opposition parties to get them to bring forward motions of non-confidence whenever the federal government fails to satisfy the needs of eastern farmers.

The delegates also resolved that the Catholic Farmers' Union would take no part in any of the activities of the Estates General of French Canada, an organization comprised of representatives of French-speaking associations which meets to discuss reconstituting the Canadian constitution.

The decision was based on the stand that the farmers' union is a socio-economic organization not an ethnic one and should confine itself to defending the economic interests of its members.
