The merchant does not require to keep a large stock on hand swelling its price with interest, for the factory is an immediate source of supply to him, at the cost of a postal card, or at most a telegram. He loses nothing, therefore, from being overstocked. The article is a staple one, for which there is, as constant a demand as for wheat or flour, and the merchant can therefore sell it at a minimum rate of profit.

FREDERICK McLEAN, a young man belonging to Dog River, has fallen a victim to religious hallucination. Flaubert's Salammbô.

From Messrs. Saxon & Co., of London. We have received a copy of the authorized translation of Flaubert's Salammbô, by Mr. F. Sheldon, a French scholar of high repute, who has succeeded in presenting the great novel in a striking and brilliant manner. Mr. Sheldon's translation is a very spirited and faithful performance, sustaining intact every beauty of the original, and furnishing a narrative which awakens the keenest interest and sympathy. His version does not read at all like a translation, but rather resembles a strong story written by a vigorous English pen. The romance itself is a masterpiece. The translation is equally brilliant. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREECE WARLIKE.

Troops Marching to the Front. WAR WITH TURKEY IMMINENT, THESSALY THE SCENE.

ATHENS, May 7. The government has sent a gunboat to Constantinople to take away from the Turkish Capital M. Condoriot, the Greek Minister. Greek troops are being hurried to the front with all possible speed.

ATHENS, May 7. The government has received with cheers orders to march to the frontier. The Russian Minister did not leave when the other Ministers departed. The movements of the Turkish army threaten to make Thessaly the scene of the first warlike operations. The Government has announced its intention of defending the Greek territory against any and all advances by foreigners. The population are enthusiastic over the prospect of war with Turkey. Soldiers are parading the streets singing patriotic songs. It is not believed here that Russia will take any share with the other Powers in the ulterior work of Coercion against Greece.

The Situation in Ireland.

LONDON, May 7. The Daily Telegraph says the Orange Societies throughout Ulster continue their preparations for fighting. Promises of help have been received from England, Scotland and the Colonies. It is alleged that 100,000 troops can be raised in Ireland. Michael Davitt has written a letter to the Daily News, in which he says that the difference between Chamberlain and Gladstone being irreconcilable, the proposals of the latter are acceptable to Irishmen, while those of the former are not acceptable. If Chamberlain's proposals prevail, the struggle will continue to intensify. If the Irish representatives sit at Westminster there will be constant friction of two evil-paying tributes and sitting at Westminster. It is better to choose the former, which is the lesser evil. By a stroke of genius inspired by the angel of peace, Gladstone has recognized the Irish National idea and it is to be sincerely hoped that he will not give way to Chamberlain.

A Terrible Domestic Tragedy.

TORONTO, May 7. A tragedy was enacted here this evening. Charles Reid has been separated from his wife for some time. About 6 o'clock he called at the house where his wife was asked to see her. While in the room together Reid pulled out a revolver and fired three shots at her, two taking effect. Reid evidently believing he had successfully finished his murderous work, placed the revolver to his head and fired, killing himself instantly. Mrs. Reid's wounds are not considered fatal.

Burglary.

NEW CASTLE, N. B. This morning when Messrs Sutherland and Creaghan and James Fish's stores were opened, it was found that they had been burglarized. A large amount of money is missing from the safe. A man, John was arrested on suspicion, having about \$1,900 in his possession.

A Schooner Seized.

DIGBY, N. S., May 7. The Government steamer Lansdowne to day ordered off the schooner David J. Adams, of Gloucester, Mass., which was illegally trespassing in Canadian waters. The schooner, it is reported, refused to comply with the warning, and was thereupon seized by the Lansdowne.

An Agitator Arrested.

CHICAGO, May 7. William Stahlknecht, President of the Cabinet Makers' Union, also professional agitator, was arrested at an early hour this morning, accused of intimidating workmen.

The Cadby Case.

FREDERICTON, May 7. The Supreme Court to-day delivered judgment in the Cadby case, refusing the application for the prisoner's discharge.

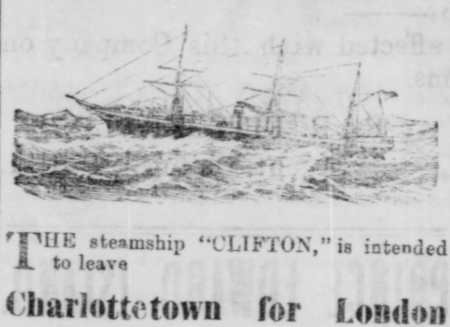
