Rangers May Come Back To Haunt Leafs Tonight

Toronto Maple Leafs have more reason than ever to be wary of New York Rangers in National Hockey League action tonight.

The Toronto-New York affair is one of a five-game weekend schedule which has Chicago Black Hawks visiting Montreal Canadiens Saturday night and Toronto at Detroit, Montreal at New York and Chicago at Boston Sunday.

The Rangers, who have been enjoying great success at the expense of the Leafs this season—three wins and three ties in six starts—were victims of what they feel was a grave injustice Sunday when they tied 3-3 with Toronto in New York.

With Rangers leading 3-2 in the late seconds of the final period, referee Bill Friday whistled for the facemask in the New York locker room and the clock ticked off the remaining seconds. However, Friday ruled there were six seconds left and Ron Ellis scored with one second remaining to give Leafs the tie.

The Leafs have the best record 7-2, behind last night's night game and allowed fewer goals than any other team in the league.

The Combines are in third place with a record of 5-5. The Eagles have five of the loop's top scorers. Red Gravelle leads the pack with seven goals and eight assists. Ken MacDonald has the league's most assists with 13 and he has one goal. Ray Prang, climbing rapidly, scored 13 points, six of them goals. Tied with 12 points each are Marty Martin and Tony Licari. Martin has nine goals and Licari eight.

Leading scorers for Edmonton are: Centreman Greg DeGhan on six goals and eight assists. Willie Gallan with 15 points, four of them goals and Al DesRoches with seven goals and four assists.
