N.B. Highway To Ferry Will Be Reconstructed

Motorists from Prince Edward Island will be pleased to learn that the seven mile stretch of road from Port Eggle to Cape Tormentine will be reconstructed by the New Brunswick department of highways this summer.

Hon. J. George MacKay, Island highways minister, yesterday received a letter from the New Brunswick Highways Minister, Hon. J. S. Brooks advising him that the work will be commenced shortly after June 11 at which time tenders for the work will be opened.

This section of the road leading to the boat has been in a state of disrepair for some time now and Mr. MacKay said he was very pleased that action was being taken to improve conditions, even though the road would be under construction during the coming tourist season.

In the same communication, Mr. MacKay received a warm invitation from the New Brunswick minister to attend the Eastern Canadian Conference for highway officials which is to be held in Fredericton this fall.

'Shine' Charge Brings Fine

SUMMERSIDE — A fine of \$100 and costs was imposed on an Alberton man when he pleaded guilty to unlawful possession of 25 pints of moonshine when he appeared in Magistrate's Court here Monday morning.

An RCMP constable said the moonshine was found in a truck driven by the accused when it was stopped on Saturday. Twenty-five 12-ounce bottles were discovered in a burlap bag.

A fine of \$100 and costs was drawn by a man of no stated address when he pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of operating a motor vehicle while impaired.

A Lennox Island resident pleaded guilty to a charge of being intoxicated on an Indian reservation and was fined \$50 and costs or 10 days because of his former record.

Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q.C., presided.

Peril Is Seen In Veto Power

OTTAWA (CP) — CCF and Liberal members of the Commons said Monday night a proposed section of the government's National Energy Board bill would give the cabinet too great a power of veto over board decisions.

Both the opposition groups called for elimination of the clause, which would empower the cabinet to create certain exemptions from operations of the legislation.

"Perfectly ridiculous," said Hazen Argue, CCF House leader, declaring that if used by the cabinet, the clause would "take away all of the powers of the board."

"An extraordinary procedure," Liberal Leader Pearson said. It was particularly strange coming from the sponsor of the measure, Trade Minister Churchill, who when in Opposition used to speak of need of reducing the power of the cabinet.

Mr. Churchill said instead of giving all powers to the board, as some opposition speakers favored, the government wanted the cabinet to have the responsibility. It was then responsible to Parliament for its actions.

ISLAND Red Shield Drive Will Start Today

Rallying to the call of co-chairmen L. D. MacKay and A. H. Peake, upwards of 200 volunteer workers on the Red Shield-Sunset Lodge Salvation Army appeal, were handed their area cards last night and will begin their canvass today.

The ground work of assorting call cards into zone areas, called for a great deal of reviewing and arranging by the co-chairmen, but their immediate contribution in this respect, will make it much easier for the canvassers.
