Town Growth Problems Discussed At Meeting

GEORGETOWN—The Georgetown Resources and Development group meeting in St. David's Hall on Thursday night, were hosts to a number of distinguished visitors from within and without the Province; as well as representatives from the Cardigan, Vernon River and Woodville Mills areas.

The meeting was presided over by the president of the Georgetown Group, Temple MacDonald. Reid Sangster, Provincial Director of Resources and Development introduced the guests; including, Alex Sim of Ottawa, ARDA Consultant; Roger Schwass of Toronto, Secretary Farm Radio Forum; the Borzasse, of Ottawa; of the Area Development Agency of the Federal Department of Industry; Peter Stewart, Resources Development Representative of the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture; Stewart C. Wright, Provincial Deputy Minister of Agriculture and J. MacDonald, Field Representative Resources and Development.

Preparatory resources development material, had been earlier distributed to members of the group and following short introductory remarks by the visitors; those in attendance were broken into two groups for study purposes and were given four questions to try and come up with answers to.

The two groups confined, in the main, their findings to the particular and vital questions at present confronting the Town of Georgetown.

AREA PLAN NEEDED
It was decided that the main things that the people of this area most want to see brought about are the installation of a water and sewage system; the drawing up of a plan of the area, showing not only the present physical outline of the town but also what town planning has laid out for the years ahead.

It was the unanimous feeling of the meeting that the civic authorities should move at once on the problem of water and sewage installation, as any delay in the guaranteeing that these facilities would be operative within two years, will have an immediate reverse effect.

Creamery Given Loan

A \$33,000 loan has been granted by the provincial government to Mercol Co-operative Creamery Limited under the terms of the Industrial Establishment Promotion Act.

The loan will be used to complete production facilities in the plant, particularly in the cheese-making section, said Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter.

It is the second loan made by the government to the Mercol dairy. About a year ago the organization received a \$150,000 loan towards construction of a new plant, after the former plant was destroyed by fire.

Bell Inquest Held Thurs.

That Thomas Allen Bell, Murray Harbour came to his death at the intersection of Brudenell Road and Bell's Hill, on or about the 7th day of August 1964, at approximately 11:30 p.m., as a result of brain damage caused by being thrown from the truck of which he was the driver, was the verdict of the jury at the inquest held at Georgetown Thursday, Oct. 1.

The government has decided to extend 15 days on charges of the use of saccharin in the manufacture of drinks to ban other synthetic sweetening agents. The announcement said.
