RECEIVE GARTER

WINDSOR, England (Reuters) Queen Elizabeth today buckled a jewelled garter around the left knee of her prime minister, Sir Anthony Eden, investing him as a knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, the oldest European order of chivalry.

In a ceremony more than 600 years old, she also invested two other new knights of the order, Earl Attlee, former leader of the Labor party and prime minister from 1945 until 1951, and Lord Ivesagh, chancellor of Dublin University.

Sir Winston Churchill, who was invested as a knight of the garter two years ago, was one of Eden's supporters today. The formal investiture followed conferring of the award on Eden last year.

The Queen Mother, a lady of the garter, the Duke of Edinburgh and the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester also were at the private ceremony.

Egmont Bay Fishermen Lost 3 Fleets Mackerel Nets

Six mackerel fishermen from Egmont Bay, whose lives were in peril on Monday when a sudden storm whipped up mountainous waves, while they were fishing in Northumberland Strait lost three fleets of mackerel nets to the high seas, two of which were recovered yesterday. It is reported that the third fleet has been sighted near the Borden-Cape Tormentine ferry, some distance off P. E. I. Each fleet contains 20 to 30 nets so the loss is heavy if they are not recovered.

The three boats each contained two men who were Camille Joseph Gallant and Joseph T. Arsenault; Joseph and Leo Cassie; and John Barriault and Adrian Arsenault. The latter is a farmer who was a substitute crewman for the day and it was he and his partner John Barriault who were rescued by the C.G.S. Kapuskasing, which was stationed for several days in Summerside. The Kapuskasing was aided in her search for the boats by a search and rescue plane from Greenwood.

Barriault and Arsenault anchored their boat in the strait before boarding the rescue boat for Summerside and went out on the Hydrographic survey ship the following day.
