**SIR LOUIS AT SOURIS**

There are not a few naive remarks in the speech delivered by the Honourable Sir Louis Henry Davies at Souris. At the beginning of it he said:

"Elections are becoming more of a science every day and it behoves the Liberal organizations here to work in well marked-out plans of campaign."

There is wealth of suggestion in this—in view of the "human devices" that are now being practiced "all along the line," from Skinner's Pond to Souris Break water, and the malice influence which has in the elections of recent years been repeatedly brought to bear by "Liberal organizations" to the confusion and defeat of public opinion in this Province. Truly it behoves electors who believe that "righteousness exalteth a nation" to be on their guard and to work hard for the triumph of the right.

Continuing, Sir Louis said:—

"Mr. Fisher then took up the matter of Cold Storage for perishable products to Britain: In this he was eminently successful so that now a complete system of Cold Storage has been established from British Columbia in the Pacific to the Maritime Provinces in the Atlantic—a complete system of cold storage warehouses, by railways and by steamboats—a complete chain. Twenty-eight steamers are now provided with Cold Storage facilities, and the great advantages resulting are everywhere visible, particularly in perishable products as butter, eggs, poultry, fruit, &c."

The italics are ours. In view of the facts and conditions here, the clear inference to be drawn from this remark is that, in the opinion of Sir Louis Davies, P. E. Island is nowhere! P. E. Island has not been reached by cold storage facilities—except such as caused the total destruction of the poultry we sent over to England last fall!

Again, Sir Louis, said:

"The strong business management of the government in fostering every branch of agricultural production, in opening up markets, has resulted in bringing to the farmers of Canada the largest measure of the present prosperity now evidenced on every side."

The humour of this will be appreciated by those of our farmers who have been compelled to sell their oats at twenty-eight cents per bushel and their potatoes at 15 cents. The "fostering" efforts of the government are seen in millions of bushels of American corn, admitted to our market free of duty to drive out of our markets as many bushels of our farmers' oats. It is to be seen, too, in the practical closing of the markets of Germany against Canadian products of all kinds, and in the dismissal of such men as Mr. Dillon, employed by the late government in building up the dairy interests of this Province.

"The story of Canada's progress," says Sir Louis, "in the short time under Liberal rule, reads like a story in the Arabian Nights." This is a story to tell to the marines—not to the farmers of Prince Edward Island, who by their own hard labor, and the favor of Providence, have brought a measure of prosperity to Canada notwithstanding the mismanagement of the men in office.

Another funny remark to come from Sir Louis was this:

"Although last year we spent \$53,000,000, not one dollar of the amount could be found to be spent wrongly."

When it is remembered that while the Liberal-Conservative Government was spending about \$40,000,000 a year—\$12,000,000 or \$13,000,000 less than the new Liberals spent last year—Sir Louis went all over this country denouncing the extravagance of the Administration and viewing "with alarm" the financial burdens of the oppressed people—this remark of Sir Louis' is, indeed, remarkable!

able! Conservative expenditures of \$40,000,000 a year were in the opinion of Sir Louis all wrong; Liberal expenditures of \$53,000,000 a year are, in the opinion of the same Sir Louis, all right. Consistency then, art a jewel.

"Not one single charge," says Sir Louis, "can now be preferred" against the immaculates of whom the immaculate Tarte is master. What about the following list of personal charges, re Washington Commission, in which the name of Sir Louis Davies is prominent as usual:

**LATEST LETTER FROM CORP. O'REILLY.**

KLIP RIVER, Transvaal, S. A. Sept. 24, 1900.

DEAR FATHER.—I suppose you are worried at my long silence. But I had various reasons for it. I have had only one letter and two papers from home in two months. Company G has been on the armored train since July 20th, and we were getting tired of the tameness and inactivity when the long-expected and welcome telegram last night said we were to leave here for Canada as soon as possible. The telegram also stated that anyone desiring to re-enlist for further active service could do so; but I don't believe there will be many to do so, and I cannot blame them. To all appearances we will be soon returning. I have enjoyed good health all through the campaign, and I am glad now I was put on the armored train as it has given me a fine chance to see the country.

We patrolled the railroad line from Kroonstad to Pretoria, and we had a fairly good time and decent rations. We have been at it here the last eight days, and there are with us two companies of the Royal Irish Rifles. They are the men who were captured from General Gatacre last April, and released June 6th. They are a fine lot of men, have a rich brogue, and are jolly with it. The rest of the regiment are stationed sixteen miles north of Pretoria. There is a large number of sick scattered around in hospitals and other places.

An amusing incident occurred here last week. On August 31st we went to Elandsfontein taking the General and staff to Pretoria, returning the same day. We were ordered to remain in the cars the next night and be ready for an early start next morning. Before daylight we ran down to Klip River where we learned that the Boers had stopped a train and after looting it set it on fire. Probably you have already heard of it. They killed two men and wounded one. At Klip River we prepared for an encounter, but when we arrived on the scene, three miles below, the train was ablaze, and 200 mounted men around it. The Boers had retreated to a safe distance and were laughing, and perhaps laughing, at us from the hill-sides. After saying what we could from the train, we were told by the officer in charge we could have the scar's' rick's'cock. The train came in here. The stock consisted of preserves, canned meats and a dried material. Most of us laid in quite a supply, after which a young fellow in my car (I have charge of one) composed a jingling rhyme on Company G's jam. Some of the boys sent it to the St. John papers to have printed, and I send you a copy in the hope the CharloTTetown boys may have fun over it. Hoping to see my old friends soon, I remain,
