REV. C. BARKER, formerly pastor of the Bible Christian Church in this city, died suddenly at his residence, 200 Horton Street, London, Ont., on Monday, Nov. 14. Mr. Barker preached twice last Sabbath, retired to rest about 11 p. m., and was found dead in his bed the next morning. A memorial service will be held in the B. C. Church tomorrow evening.

CHANCE FOR OARSMEN.—A despatch from Chicago says it is learned that Mr. Frank French, of Sydney, New South Wales, an enthusiastic supporter of aquatics in that city, has offered a prize of £300 to be rowed for over the championship course on Paramatta River during the month of September next year. He stipulates that should two men visit Sydney to represent England, Canada or America, he will increase the sum to £500.

A CHARITY.—There resides on King street, near the Engine house, an old woman named McKinnon, who is an object of Charity. She has no friends in the city, and no visible means of support. The neighbors have been very kind to her, but continued support of her by them has been a heavy tax, and it is now time the government, or parties interested, should get her a berth in the Poor House. But it is said she is not willing to leave the house in which she has a life interest. This being the case, it is difficult to know the best course to pursue. We think, however, the heirs of the property, whoever they are, and the Government could easily settle the difficulty, and relieve a charitable neighborhood of this burden.

FARMERS in the Royalty justly complain of the by-law recently passed by the City Council. It will not protect their flocks from the ravages of vicious dogs. It will not materially decrease the canine race in the city. For these reasons the farmers look upon the recent action of the Council as a mockery of their repeated appeals for a good by-law—one that would give them their flocks protection. If the City Council did not intend to pass a law for the benefit of the farmers, and if they wished to protect the beautiful "Newfoundlander" of the city, why did they not let it stand as it was? It would then be more just to citizens and give the same protection to our sheep-raising industry. When the Council meet again and know they have muddled their work, we feel sure they will take steps to pass a by-law which will meet the requirements of the case.—The muzzle, or clog, or death!

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, Nov. 17. The fire on the steamer Severn, yesterday, was caused by the bursting of a barrel of naphtha.

The Ballina sub-commission of the Land Court, yesterday, made sweeping reductions of rents, averaging 50 per cent.

The whole of the registered letters which were believed to have contained diamonds and watches to the value of £40,000 have been stolen at Hatton Garden Post Office, in London.

UNITED STATES. OSHKOSH, Wis., Nov. 17. A meeting of the business men of Oshkosh and Fond du Lac memorialized the Secretary of War, setting forth the damage done to these cities and the country around and asking immediate relief by the removal of a part of the Government dam at Menasha and Appleton. The damage is already estimated at \$500,000.

ROCHESTER, Nov. 17. Director Swift, of the Warner Observatory, at 11 o'clock on the 16th inst. covered Pallas's comet in the constellation of Cassiopeia, having right ascension about one hour fifty minutes, declination north 71 degrees, motion slowly westward, with slight central condensation but no tail visible.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Nov. 17. William Robinson, a notorious character of Maiden, six miles above Charleston, shot Marshall Allen Belliker last night, killing him instantly. He also fired two shots at the Mayor, but missed. Robinson was arrested and brought here. It is rumored that a mob is coming from Malden to lynch Robinson, and a company of militia has been ordered to be ready to protect the prisoner.

CHICAGO, Nov. 17. The Western Diamond Match factory was burned last night. Loss, \$39,000.

EUROPEAN. CALCUTTA, Nov. 17. The Times of India announces that Gen. Sir Garnet Roberts will succeed Sir Francis Wolsley as Quarter-Master General of the British army.

VIENNA, Nov. 17. One thousand further applications have been sent to the land commission.

PESTH, Nov. 17. Sarah Berchardt is seriously ill.

DURBAN, Nov. 17. Dervish Pasha has been blockaded by Albanian mountaineers. Troops have succeeded in freeing him.

LONDON, Nov. 17. The Times' Constantinople report says there is reason to fear the Sultan intends to give more encouragement to the Arab movement in Northern Africa. The Palace keeps up constant communication with the Tunisian insurgents, and the Arabs in Tripoli.

BERLIN, Nov. 17. It is thought that Bismarck reckons on the impossibility of Richter and Windthorst coming to terms, thereby causing dissension among the opposition, which Bismarck expects will strengthen his party. The Emperor's speech opening Reichstag is awaited with anxiety. The situation is critical. Bismarck shows no signs of giving way.

BERLIN, Nov. 17. Emperor William did not open the Reichstag in person. Prince Bismarck read the speech from the Throne.

PANAMA. PANAMA, Nov. 7, via NEW YORK, Nov. 17. The town of Manzanilla was destroyed by a storm on the 26th of October. The barques James B. Bell and Antioch, and the schooner Theresia, of San Francisco, were lost. Every vessel in the Bay of Manzanilla was driven ashore. The loss is estimated at half a million.
