DEATH OF PARNELL.

Heart Disease the Cause

LONDON, Oct. 7.

Charles Stewart Parnell, the celebrated Irish Home Rule advocate, died here last evening of heart disease.

Seizure of the Otto.

An Explanation from Washington.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.

The statement contained in a despatch from Ottawa published in the papers, that the British sealer Otto had been seized by the United States' ship Mohican on account of irregularity in papers, is pronounced at the Navy Department as being without a foundation.

Disastrous Fire.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Oct. 7.

A fire in the east divinity hall of Yale University has damaged the building to the extent of about \$10,000.

Children to be Vaccinated.

HALIFAX, Oct. 7.

On account of the existence of smallpox in New Brunswick, the Board of Health has recommended the vaccination of all children in Halifax who have not hitherto been vaccinated.

Given States Prison.

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.

Robert Bell, convicted of inducing young girls to visit for immoral purposes a church of which he was assistant janitor, has been sentenced to five years in the state prison and pay a fine of \$1,000.

A Contractor Shot.

HALIFAX, Oct. 7.

Dan Dunn, a well-known Nova Scotian railway contractor, was recently shot in a melee on a railway in Michigan.

Presbyterian Synod.

HALIFAX, Oct. 7.

The Presbyterian Synod adjourned last night to meet in St. John on the first Thursday in October, 1892.

The Right Hon. William Henry Smith, First Lord of the Treasury, died yesterday. He left a fortune of \$10,000,000.

ROBBERY AT SOURIS.—On Saturday night or Sunday morning, the warehouse of Matthew McLean & Co., at Souris, was broken into, and some clothing and dry goods taken therefrom. AFTER DAMAGES.—A Halifax despatch says: Mrs. R. Roman, who lost over \$700 worth of stock at the fire, has retained counsel to bring an action against the city for damages.
