...LEFT FOR SYDNEY — The Pugwash, tow-boat tending Dredge 115 at Montague, left yesterday for Sydney where it will put up for the winter months. It is unofficially reported that the dredge 115 will remain at Montague for the winter, and will complete the final touches to the river channel in the spring. Two points at the beginning of the second and third cuts yet remain to be removed, after which vessels will have no difficulty entering Montague port.

...WORK COMPLETED — Crib work at the east end of Steven's Wharf in Montague was completed yesterday, and there remains for this year the facing of the wharf and crib work to the rear of the wharf. It is proposed to sink new piles next spring, place creosoted inner stringers, and top it with a new creosoted deck. This will complete the job, and provide the ships with sufficient wharfage space. It has been unofficially rumored that the dock between the Steven's Wharf and Poole and Thompson's Wharf may be dredged out to provide a small sheltered docking space for fishing boats. Should this be done, it will be welcomed by the fishermen who have, in the past, had to leave their boats in practically open water. The work would not be extensive, but the benefit derived would be great.

Government's policy was to be made shortly. But at the same time he did not believe there had been any strong case made for increases on the Government's floor prices.

The Government had set a floor of 63 cents a pound on butter; 31 1/2 cents a pound on bacon; 38 cents a dozen for grade "A" large eggs and 28 cents a pound on cheese.

But none of these products had been offered to the Government so far this year. Market prices were well above the price-support level.

Speech Highlights

In a two-hour speech, replying to conference discussion of national agricultural policy, Mr. Gardiner stated:

1. The question of continuation of Federal subsidy on the movement of feed grains from the prairies now is up for cabinet consideration. An announcement will be made in the Commons "very shortly."

2. Some implement companies have supplied Western farmers with equipment not as good as expected. The companies knew of this development and were considering the production of equipment "in different form".

3. If farmers are to improve their harvesting of wheat, they will have to consider ways of shortening the production season and getting seed planted at least 10 days earlier. If this isn't done, the prosperity of the whole agricultural industry from one end of the country to the other will be affected.

4. He had been surprised on the day the conference opened that one newspaper headlined a story saying the price of eggs dropped 12 cents a dozen in 24 hours. He had expected that drop—a seasonal one—and wondered why the price had stayed up so long.

But while the price of eggs may be declining, said Mr. Gardiner, the producer has received an average price this year of 46 1/2 cents a dozen—compared with 34 cents last year. If anything was to be emphasized it was the 12-cent-a-dozen increase the producer got, not the price drop.

25th Anniversary Of Ordination

Rev. William A. McPhee next Wednesday, December 12, will celebrate the 25th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. Presently located in Clandonald, Alta., Father McPhee was ordained in his home parish at Georgetown, where he had come for the ordination. He studied in Toronto at St. Augustine Seminary, and also at Emmetsburg, Maryland.

He is a son of the late Captain and Mrs. Hugh McPhee, Georgetown. Two sisters and a brother reside in this city. They are Rev. Mother Paula, who recently retired as Superintendent of the Charlottetown Hospital; Miss Isabelle McPhee and Mr. H. Frank McPhee, K. C. Charlottetown barrister. Another brother, John, was killed in the First World War.
