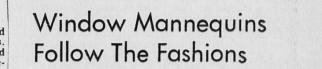

Window Mannequins Follow The Fashions

In this era of fall, thin fashion-able, there are no short, chubby dummies. It would be hard to find clothes to fit an 1890 mannequin, with her hour-glass figure. She would look startlingly out-of-place with wide-eyed stare, over-long eye-lashes and tiny pink mouth. Until the 1930s display mannequins were made of wax and covered with hair, their charms if things got too hot for them.

Every mannequin is picked for a particular area and to do a particular job. Mr. Clarke says: "You don't just phone a manufacturer and say send 200 mannequins. We have different poses and actions for sports or high fashion."
Mannequins were first used in major fashion centres just as clothing styles do. Europeans were the first to use the black velvet and wire forms now popular for ultra-high fashion displays. In New York, some Negro mannequins are being turned out.
Most of the dummies have several wig sets, sometimes dressed by the store display staff, sometimes by experts who earn a living dressing wigs and refashioning mannequins. Like real girls, they need a makeup job occasionally. Unlike real girls, they can get a complete change of face and expression.

A good mannequin, which costs \$165 or more, lasts about three to four years with treats every six months or so. Mr. Clarke estimates Eaton's store in Toronto always has 300 or 400 mannequins in use. Like some real-life mannequins, they are conscious females, mannequins can be costly and troublesome. But male mannequins are at least as bothersome, Mr. Clarke says, "because you can get a better sculpturing job. The best mannequins should live a life of their own."
