THE WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT

Your attention is directed to the following provisions of the said Act:

SECTION 66
 SUB-SECTION (4)

Where any work within the scope of this Part is undertaken by a contractor or contractors, the person for whom such work is undertaken shall, within seven days after the making of any such contract notify the Board in writing of the making of such contract or contracts and in such notice shall state:

- (a) the name and address of the contractor or contractors;
- (b) The nature of the work to be performed by the contractor or contractors;
- (c) the amount payable under the contract, whether a lump sum or in proportion to the amount of work done, and in the latter case give the full particulars;
- (d) the probable length of time for completion of the work to be performed by the contractor or contractors.

Strange But True

Weaver birds actually weave their nests out of fine branches, roots and grasses. They interlace them in such a way that the whole structure is solid. This amazing craftsman completes its labors by lining the interior with fine grass stems for the reception of the eggs.

This arduous task is followed by a period of rest. Then the male busies himself by lining the interior with clay. While this material is still soft fire-fles are fastened into it like candles into a candlestick for the purpose of lighting the inside of the nest or of frightening away rats, snakes and other enemies.

The hornbill derives its name from its enormous beak which gives it such a grotesque appearance. The nesting habits of these birds is interesting to say the least. The eggs are deposited in the hollow of a tree, and when the time comes to hatch, the female bird, after a long wait, is then retired to the cavity and is then only a narrow slit at the top of the nest is left through which she can poke her bill. Why this imprisonment? To protect the eggs against monkeys and tree-climbing lizards.

The imprisonment lasts, until the young are strong enough to fly away and fend for themselves, at which time the male opens the prison door.

The widespread and silly notion that to break a mirror brings seven years' bad luck is a hand-down from the first century of the Christian era in ancient Rome. The Roman believed that the health of a person changed every seven years, and since the mirror reflected the appearance of the person, to break it was the same as breaking the health for seven years. Thus originated the phrase "You'll have seven years' bad luck if you break a mirror". Two out of every three people still believe the old Roman superstition.

One of the most amazing cases of wild human beings came to light some years ago in India when a missionary discovered two young girls living in a cave with a wolf and her three offspring. The girls were taken to the orphanage in Madras where the younger one—a child of about two years of age—died the following year. The other lived until she was eighteen. And strange but true, she never learned to speak more than a few words, never carried herself perfectly erect, and never learned how to run!

All caterpillars are born nude, but they clothe themselves in tiny wooden tubes cut from furniture or clothes and artfully woven with silk into a stout piece of cloth, the inside of which is finished off with a lining of pure silk—the perfect combination for warmth and comfort! And the color of the suit is the same as the stuff from which it is taken. When the caterpillar outgrows his suit he cleverly adds a ring of similar material to each end.

The present Queen Elizabeth was the first English Queen to wear silk stockings.

The water-pheasants of India and Ceylon build nests of grass which floats on the surface of the water. The eggs, four to six in number, are white when laid, but the sagacious mother dunks them over with mud to render them less conspicuous. When leaving the nest for any length of time she covers it with weeds. Truly a case of wild-life wisdom.

When a Judge is pronouncing the death sentence in Britain today, an old custom is observed, namely: He places a black cloth on his white wig and the warden flies a black flag from the prison after an execution has taken place.

A robin made her nest in the saddle bag of John Athron's bicycle, so until the eggs were hatched John walked to work. It happened at Dorchester, England.

In Java, many of the natives who dwell along the coast engage in the perilous occupation of cliff climbing to collect edible birds' eggs. The nests are no less sought

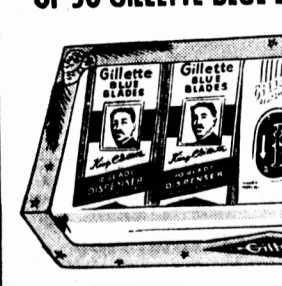

On December 6, 1917, 2,000 tons of high explosives aboard the French munitions ship Mont Blanc detonated in the Halifax Harbor. U. S. Air Force Wants More Bases In The U.K.

LONDON, Dec. 10—(AP)—The U. S. Air Force wants to take over more air bases to double the number of fighters and bombers it may station in Britain. The U. S. Third Air Force now has about 30,000 airmen in Britain and an unspecified number of bombers and fighters. An Air Ministry spokesman said the Third Air Force wants to "about double" its existing facilities. "The catch is that the Royal Air Force also is expanding and is going to need more bases, too," he added.
