Habs Regain Old Form; Leafs Rape Leafs 4-2

MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal Canadiens regained their scoring prowess in the last period to drop Toronto Maple Leafs 4-2 in National Hockey League play Thursday night.

The score was tied 2-2 going into the final period, but goals by Bernie (Boom) Boom Geoffrion and R. J. P. Bouchard put the Canadiens ahead 3-2 in the first period.

The win gives Montreal four points, one more than Toronto and three less than league-leading Detroit, who defeated Boston Thursday night.

Montreal is in a three-way tie for second place with Boston and Chicago, each with a fifth place.

Canadians were badly outplayed in the first period, but early sparking work by substitute goalie Gerry Mearns kept Leafs from scoring more than two goals.

Both Toronto goals in the first period came on blasts from the blue line. Tim Horton's power play slap shot was deflected by Dick Duff at 4:13 and rookie Kent Gosselin's drive from the blue line picked the corner less than a minute later.

Canadians caught back in the second to tie the score. Henri Richard beat Toronto goalie Johnny Bower cleanly with a 20-foot shot at 6:22 and Jean Beliveau got a gift goal when Toronto defenseman Ron Stammers slipped the puck into the net while trying to clear Beliveau's wide angle shot at 10:48.

Canadians caught fire in the third period and veteran Bernie Geoffrion's deflection on a goal-mouth pass by linemate Gilles Tremblay at 8:54 was followed in little more than a minute by Bouchard's goal, a low 25-

DETROIT (AP) — The unbeaten Detroit Red Wings went on a scoring spree Thursday night with four players netting goals and held off Boston Bruins 5-3 in a game between the two surprise teams in the National Hockey League.

The Wings, strengthening their hold on first place to three points, packed three goals into the first period in handling the Bruins' first defeat of the new season. Detroit has three victories and a tie in four games since the only club with a first goal midway through the first period.
