trade is exempted from rate increases by statute. Competitive rates—those that have been lowered to meet competition—will be raised somewhat, but a railway spokesman indicated this might not be more than about three per cent on the average.

Generally, the increases will apply on other Canadian traffic with some minor exceptions. They will not apply on U.S. goods passing through Canada in transit between Canadian points, or on goods—except coal and coke—moving between Canadian and U.S. points, which have been subjected to a number of increases as the result of U.S. action.

40 Per Cent in Two Years

On the rates to which it is applicable, the new boost brings the cumulative freight-rate increase of the last two years up to 40 per cent. The first increase was one of 21 per cent in March, 1948, followed by last September's eight per cent, which now is adjusted to 16 per cent.

Effect of the judgment is that for the first time since the fall of 1946 there now is no general rate-increase case hanging fire.

Some possibility exists that the Provinces opposing rate increases may appeal the latest judgment to the Cabinet.

Council for several of the Provinces said today they would have to study the new judgment and report to their governments before any decision could be reached on the question of an appeal.

The railways will implement the authorized increases to the full extent on competitive rates, spokesman said.

Today's judgment was unanimous—the first such among the three post-war increases. Hugh Wardrop, assistant chief commissioner, wrote the judgment, and it was concurred in by F.M. MacPherson, British Columbia representative, and Howard B. Chase, labor nominee, the others of the three-man panel that heard the final phase of the case.

Secretary Acheson and others about the need for the U. S. to import were encouraging but could "have little meaning if various interests in the U. S., including those holding high political positions, campaign for further artificial protection."

"The U. S. was not a new market for Canadian potatoes. The trade was one of many years standing. A recent increase was in line with a general trade increase. Canada's imports from the U. S., for instance, had jumped 400 per cent in 10 years.

"A large portion of our exports of potatoes to the U. S. are high-grade, certified seed potatoes which, on a quality basis alone, are preferred by the U. S. growers from the southernmost states all the way north up to and including Maine."

It had been claimed Canadian potatoes would do permanent damage to the markets of U. S. seed potato growers.

"I would suggest that, as long as the U. S. seed potato producers are content to sit on their farms and accept their cheques from the government price support administration rather than exert themselves to the extent of seeking markets, the danger is indeed real."

U. S. Producer Protected

Further, a very heavy rate of duty faced Canadian potatoes in a way that gave the U. S. producer a "great deal of protection." In the whole Canadian tariff structure there was no U. S. item which faced the duty barrier that faced Canadian potatoes entering the U. S.

Again, while Canadian producers accepted relatively low prices at home, potatoes from the Southern States entered Canada duty free.

Some Canadian potatoes did become directly or indirectly a charge against the U. S. price support funds. But that price support was not of Canada's making and "our legitimate trade should not suffer because of it."

Every cent spent by the U. S. for Canadian goods was returned to the U. S. by her best customer.

Deluged With Criticism

Senator Pirie said he has been deluged with U. S. press clippings criticizing exportation of Canadian potatoes. "Those clippings said nothing about the fact that U. S. potatoes 'are being given away or sold at one cent per hundred pounds on foreign markets where we have been doing business.'"

Portugal, Spain, Venezuela and other normal Canadian markets now reported they could get U. S. potatoes cheaper because of the price support program.

"(The U. S. producers) are criticizing Canada for selling potatoes on the American market at less than the price of American potatoes but they are overlooking the fact that they have taken away from Canada her export markets

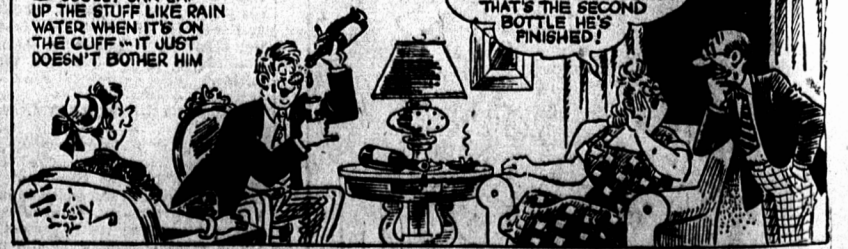
