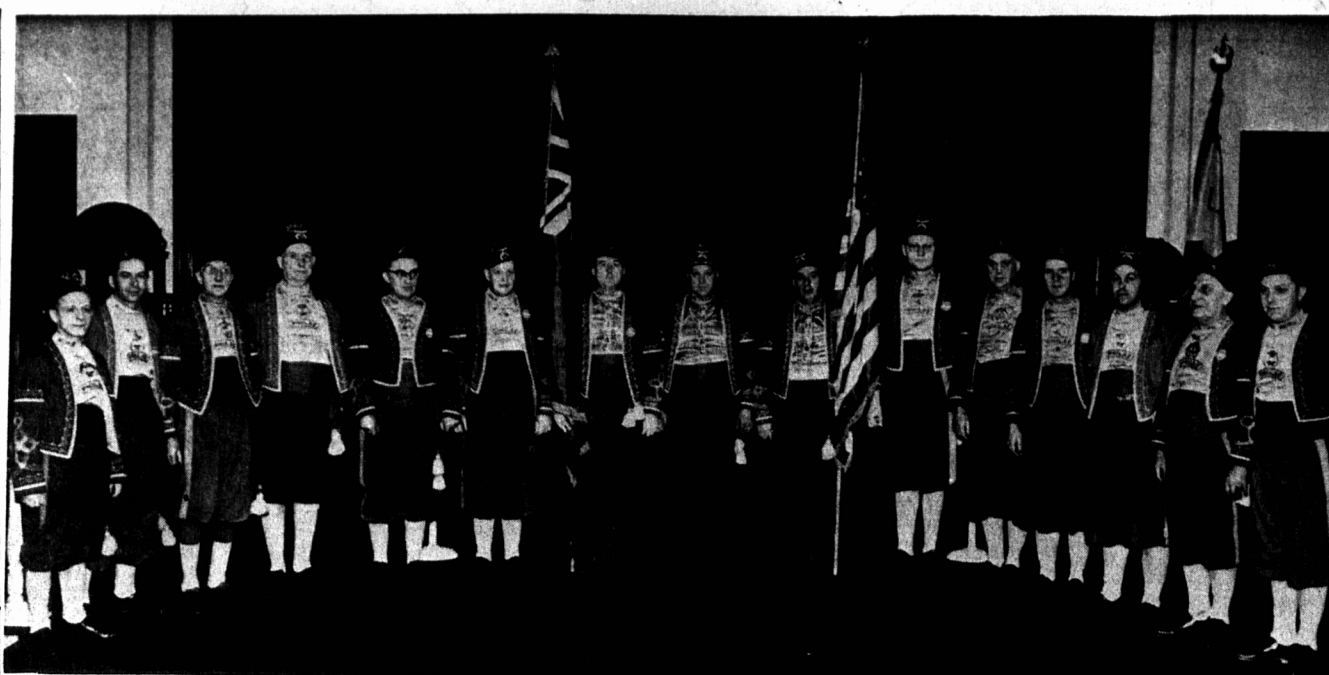

Yugoslavia Asks Cominform Be Beorganized

BELGRADE (AP)—Communist Yugoslavia demanded Wednesday that the Soviet-dominated Cominform be dissolved and replaced by a new organization that would include all socialistic movements.

The demand for junking the international organization of Communist parties was part of an article published in the new issue of Communist, a review officially representing the Yugoslav Communist party.

The article caused a sensation here. It was regarded as disclosing the Yugoslav attitude presented at the recent parley between President Tito and Soviet leaders in Belgrade.

The article was written by Veljko Vlahovic, a leading member of the Communist party central committee, chairman of a parliament's foreign relations commission and advisor to Tito at the Soviet-Yugoslav talks.

Says Teen-Agers Not Mixed-up But World Is

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—Teen-agers are not crazy mixed-up kids—but the world they live in is.

So says a University of Michigan child psychiatrist.

Dr. Ralph D. Rabinovitch, chief of the children's service, Neuro-Psychiatric Institute at the university, explains:

"With all his problems, the adolescent has priceless assets which, given proper nurture, far outweigh the negatives—but some things continually get in his way."

Dr. Rabinovitch believes many parents, in trying to give their child independence, go too far and deprive them of needed family security and guidance.

As a result, he says, they are forced to stand on legs too wobbly to hold them.

"In some families," he says, "it is as though parents no longer dare direct a child after he has reached the magic age of 16. . . . It is certainly nice to grow up with one's children, but it is also wise to be more mature than one's children."

Grain Crops Damaged By Infestation Of Aphids

"Island grain crops have suffered considerable damage from an infestation of aphids which has been prevalent throughout the Province," states Mr. F. M. Cannon, chief entomologist at the Science Service Laboratory, Charlottetown.

Damage was particularly heavy in the barley crop and detrimental effects are still being experienced in late oats. Mr. Cannon says that growers who have sprayed for this pest have experienced good results. He believes that any further extensive damage is more or less removed.

Soccer Scandal In Italy

UDINE, Italy (AP)—The worst scandal in Italian soccer exploded in new violence Tuesday night with two policemen beaten and three Udinese fans jailed.

It was the second successive day of violent demonstrations against an Italian Soccer Federation ruling dumping sensational Udinese into the "B" league for allegedly buying a victory two seasons ago. Udinese, a little "Cinderella team" which nobody thought had a chance, whipped through the 1954-55 season with the longest unbroken string of victories in the league, ending in second place.

The Italian soccer federation, after long inquiry, ruled Monday night that Udinese has bought a victory from Pro Patria of Busto Arsizio in the 1953-54 season.

PRAIRIE FARMERS

All told, Canadian farmers may produce about 500,000,000 bushels of wheat this year. This, combined with an unofficial estimate of 475,000,000 bushels of carryover wheat, may boost total Canadian supplies to a near-record 975,000,000, just slightly below the record high stocks of 983,000,000 a year ago.

The first official estimate of the Canadian crops will be published Aug. 30.

Maritime crops are doing well. About 75 per cent of Prince Edward Island's haying is completed. Tree fruits are developing satisfactorily in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick's crops are improving.

British Columbia farmers are harvesting early-sown grains. A second growth of alfalfa is being cut.
