NHL Pres. Foresees Better Balanced Teams This Year

WHEATLEY Canadian Press Staff Writer MONTREAL (CP) — The National Hockey League opens its 42nd season Wednesday for a 210-game run that president Clarence Campbell feels will produce better balance in competition. Only a single game is scheduled for Wednesday, Chicago Black Hawks visiting New York Rangers.

The champion Montreal Canadiens, heavily favored to repeat, are hosts to Boston Bruins Thursday. All teams will be in action Saturday and Sunday. "There is no doubt that at least five teams will be better balanced and there is every indication of good public response," Campbell said Tuesday. "Canadians have a pretty solid team and a great backlog of material. They don't figure to be any weaker and may have a definite advantage in the early stages."

HABS FORMIDABLE Campbell declined to forecast how the six teams will finish but described Canadiens as "in a very formidable position." "They have five of the 12 NHL all-stars on their team, and that's a high percentage. They are real all-stars, too; not just fringe. In addition, Canadiens have Maurice Richard, who didn't make the all-star team last season." "I think the 37-year-old Rocket, missed 42 of his team's 70 games last season because of a severe injury. "We are primarily concerned with balanced competition," said Campbell. "It has been coming about definitely if slowly."

Publisher's Will Ruled Invalid

OTTAWA (CP) — The Supreme Court of Canada Tuesday quashed the last will and testament of John C. Holland, retired Rock Island, Que., publisher who died March 15, 1949. It ruled he was not of sound mind when he signed a power of attorney Jan. 30, 1948 and when he made his last will and testament Feb. 18, 1949. At the time, the evidence showed, Holland was in a Vermont hospital, suffering from the result of a brain hemorrhage that paralyzed him. Mr. Holland published a weekly newspaper in Rock Island. A cousin, Linnie Holland McEwen, contested the will and the power of attorney. Executors of his estate were the late Charles R. Jenkins and Wesley H. Bradley, Sherbrooke, Que., lawyer. After a complicated series of judgments, appeals and cross-appeals in the Quebec courts and in the Supreme Court here, the final ruling Tuesday is that Mrs. McEwen wins her case. The Quebec superior court's judgment declaring the will null and void is confirmed. Jenkins' estate and Mr. Bradley are given four months to present an account of their administration of the estate. The power of attorney is declared null and void "as not having been executed by a person of sound intellect."

Park MacDonald Looks Forward To Better Season

BUFFALO, N.Y. (CP) — Parker MacDonald left winger with Buffalo Bisons of the American Hockey League, is looking forward to a better season this year because of an operation performed three weeks ago for the removal of a 1 1/2-inch piece of broken-off drill from his shoulder. "I can shoot the puck a lot better since the operation," MacDonald said Tuesday. The operation also removed a plate that had been fixed three years ago when he suffered a shoulder separation. "I knew the drill was there but I was told, 'don't worry, it won't hurt.'" However, "a couple of bumps and it really hurt." Onetime member of Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League, the 25-year-old native of Sydney, N.S., spent 1 1/2 years with New York Rangers before being farmed out to Buffalo.

Bobby Jones Recommends Standard Ball

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (AP) Bobby Jones recommended the standardization of golf balls throughout the world Tuesday on the eve of the world's first amateur championship. A total of 116 golfers representing 29 countries play the first of four rounds today on St. Andrews Old Course for the Eisenhower Cup. All will be using the smallest longer flying British balls. Jones who ranks as the greatest amateur golfer of all time, said "like the rules of golf, the ball of golf should be the same everywhere."

The small British ball operates better in the high winds so often found on seaside courses in Britain. The American ball puts better. The Eisenhower trophy — a silver cup weighing 28 pounds — goes to the national team with the lowest aggregate score after 72 holes of medal play. Some teams will compete with four players, but only the three low scorers will count each day. The poorest score will be disregarded. The British team is the favorite on the strength of fine records, experience on the Old Course of St. Andrews and superlative play in practice.

ASKS AMENDMENT

A similar resolution urges an amendment to the Ontario Fair Accommodations Practices Act which would bring apartment houses and multiple dwelling units of three or more within the scope of the act. The federation unanimously approved a motion urging every affiliated union to include in its next contract demands a reduction of the work week "without loss of take-home pay with the 30-hour week as an early result."

Decry Discrimination In Housing Using Public Funds

TORONTO (CP) — The Ontario Federation of Labor hit hard Tuesday at racial discrimination and urged an amendment to the National Housing Act to prohibit the use of public funds by builders guilty of refusing homes to colored people. A resolution submitted by Local 434, Office Employees International Union (CLC) in Toronto, said it is apparent that discrimination on the ground of race, creed or color is still prevalent in the sales of homes built under the act. "This policy of denying a person equal rights in choosing a place to live solely because of his color or religion is contrary to our Canadian democratic principles."

Another resolution passed urged a petition to the Ontario government to press for federal legislation reducing the qualifying age for old age pensions to 65 years from 70 without means test.
