

Polish Flyer Sees Allies Flying MIG's As Unbeatable Team



Franciszek Jarecki, a Polish pilot who escaped with the first Russian jet fighter to fall into Western hands, told Toronto officials that if Canadian and U. S. airmen could fly the MIG-15's they could shoot any enemy plane down the 22-year-old flyer, who plans to attend a Pennsylvania college, is currently touring Canadian and U. S. cities. He claimed the MIG-15 was capable of a speed of 750 mph and could climb to 30,000 feet while the USAF's Sabre jet could reach only 40,000 feet and had a slower speed. Jarecki was a flight leader of four MIG-15's in the Polish air force flying over the Baltic Sea when he decided to make a break for the Danish island of Bornholm.
