

# Catholic Youth Rallies To Have Noted Speaker

Rev. James P. Conroy, well known American youth worker, columnist and radio commentator, will be guest speaker at two province-wide rallies which will close Catholic Youth Week to be held during October 16-25. This special week has been proclaimed by His Excellency, Malcolm A. MacEachern, Bishop of Charlottetown, in a letter addressed to priests, Catholic schools, and youth workers.

The aim of the week is to make youth aware of their special mission in the modern world and to propose the ideals which must inspire them. It is hoped too, to make parents, teachers, and all adults more conscious of their guiding role in preparing Christian Youth to meet a challenging world.

The week will be observed in Island parishes by special religious services and sermons. On Sunday, Oct. 18, a special sermon will be addressed to the Youth.

There being no criminal cases on the October docket, a Grand Jury was not called.

Commencing at 11 o'clock this morning the court will hear a civil action case involving Barry McCabe, plaintiff, and Garth Scott, defendant, both of Charlottetown.

J.O.C. Campbell, Q.C. is representing the plaintiff, and Allison Gilie's the defendant. A petit jury will be selected today.

Father Conroy will introduce the movement known as "The Fighting 60th" which he began ten years ago and which has helped thousands of young people find happiness and fulfillment. The movement is designed to assist youth in keeping the social norms of the 6th and 9th Commandments of God.

Father Conroy will also address parents' groups and appear on radio and television.

## License Drive Bringing Results

The drive on Charlottetown dog owners which was started several days ago by the City Police is beginning to have results, said Deputy Chief Stern Webster, yesterday.

Some have come forward of their own volition and paid the licence, but in the case of 11 others each was issued with a summons. In all of the latter the defendants presented themselves at the police station and paid the tax plus court costs rather than wait until the date specified on the summons for court appearance.

Deputy Webster stated that the dog catcher, Gus Wilson, has been instructed to press the drive until all city dog owners have either purchased licences or have disposed of their animals.

## Defective Bridge Pier Requires Specialists

Gecon Company, a subsidiary of Foundation Maritime Ltd., the company with the contract to construct the sub-structure of the new Hillsboro Bridge, will begin work at once in an effort to complete the south pier earlier than expected.

About two weeks ago an inspection of the new pier revealed that a large number of loose, un-hardened areas existed throughout its entire length.

The possibility also exists that the old bridge may be closed to heavy trucks in the near future. Though a survey of its present and future reliability is thought to be under way, highway department officials would neither comment on this rumor nor speculate on the possibility of a traffic ban.

## Development Plan Causes Controversy In Council

Proposed development of the acres of land west of the North River Road touched off a controversy at the City Council meeting here last evening that was both humorous and serious, subtle and ridiculous.

Before a jam-packed Council chamber, Councillor H.E. Hyndman asked "where are we going to get the money for this development. How much will it cost and how much are we going to do?" Councillor Gaudet: "We don't know yet, all we have done is propose a plan in principle."

Considerable discussion took place over the resignation of Lt. Col. Frank J. Storey who had headed the Town Planning Committee.

City Recorder K.M. Martin noted that the Council could not decide anything at the meeting as there were emergent matters to be dealt with and another planning head had to be named even if it were only during the interim period while Col. Storey could be approached regarding a re-appointment.

DISPOSAL LIMIT OUT Reporting to the Council, W.H. Crandall of Moncton stated that his engineers were convinced that it would not be necessary for the City to have a sewage disposal unit. He also stated that the system designed would be capable of servicing all the land in the new area that required to be serviced and that studies indicated that there is at least eight times the dilution that is necessary.

NOT COMMITTED COUN. HYNDMAN: "I suppose you will put that in cold storage."

COUN. GAUDET: "We have not committed ourselves. We have just asked for a tender package."

COUN. HYNDMAN: "Were these engineers not working in conjunction with Col. Storey while he was engaged in Town planning?"

COUN. GAUDET: "We hired consultants for a survey and a survey map!"

COUN. HYNDMAN: "A damned expensive map!"

COUN. GAUDET went to say that the Council had just as much regard for the taxpayers as anyone as they were taxpayers themselves. On this proposed development "we went on the assumption that it might be a 10-year plan. The figure mentioned is cost was \$190,000 so that would be \$19,000 a year. Let's assume 10 homes are erected each year. At the end of the first year we would collect full tax rate on these homes for the next nine years and so on.

"All we have now is an assessment of \$5,000 on 24 acres of land. It will be developed within the scope of our ability," he said.

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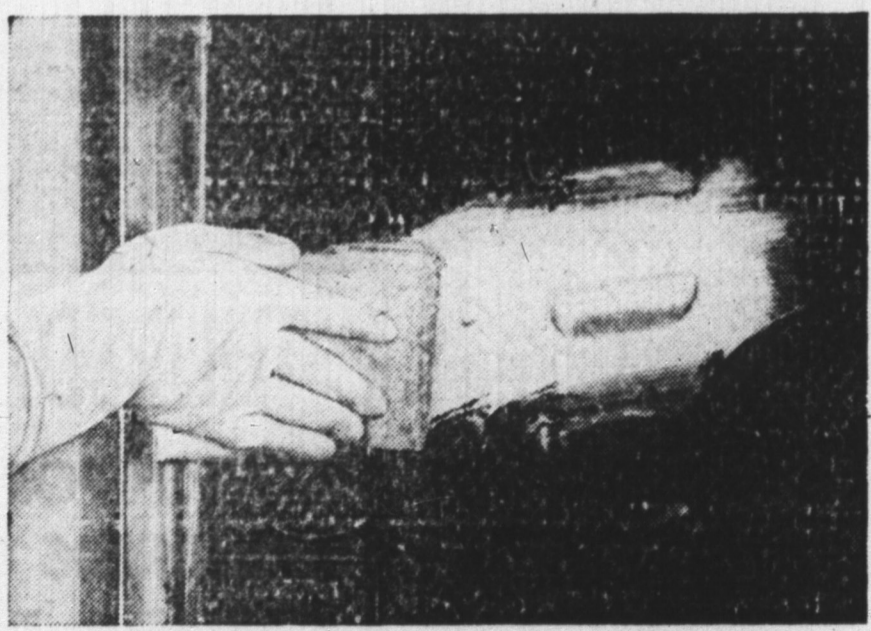
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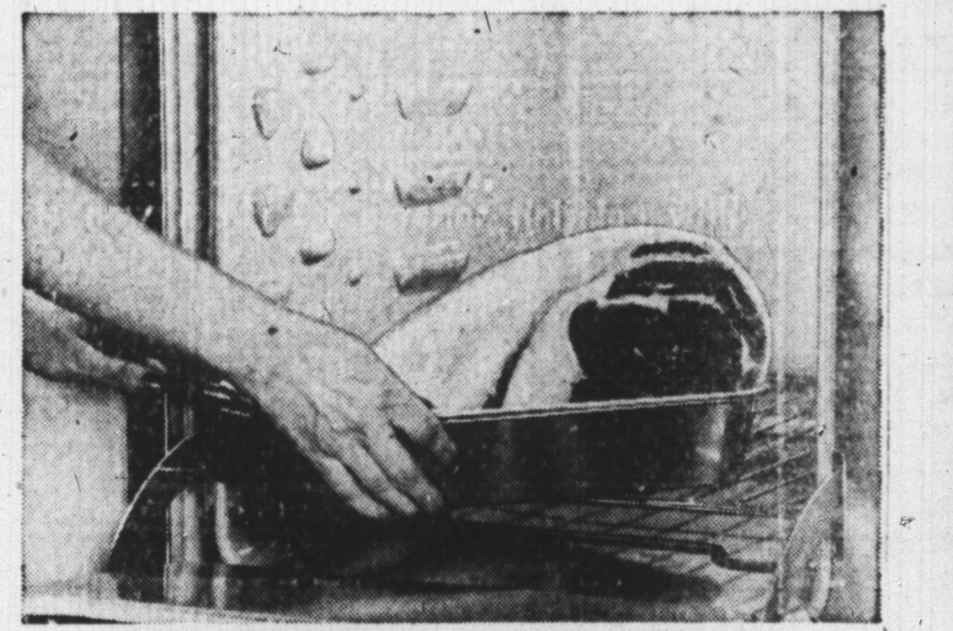
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## LOCAL BRIEFS
