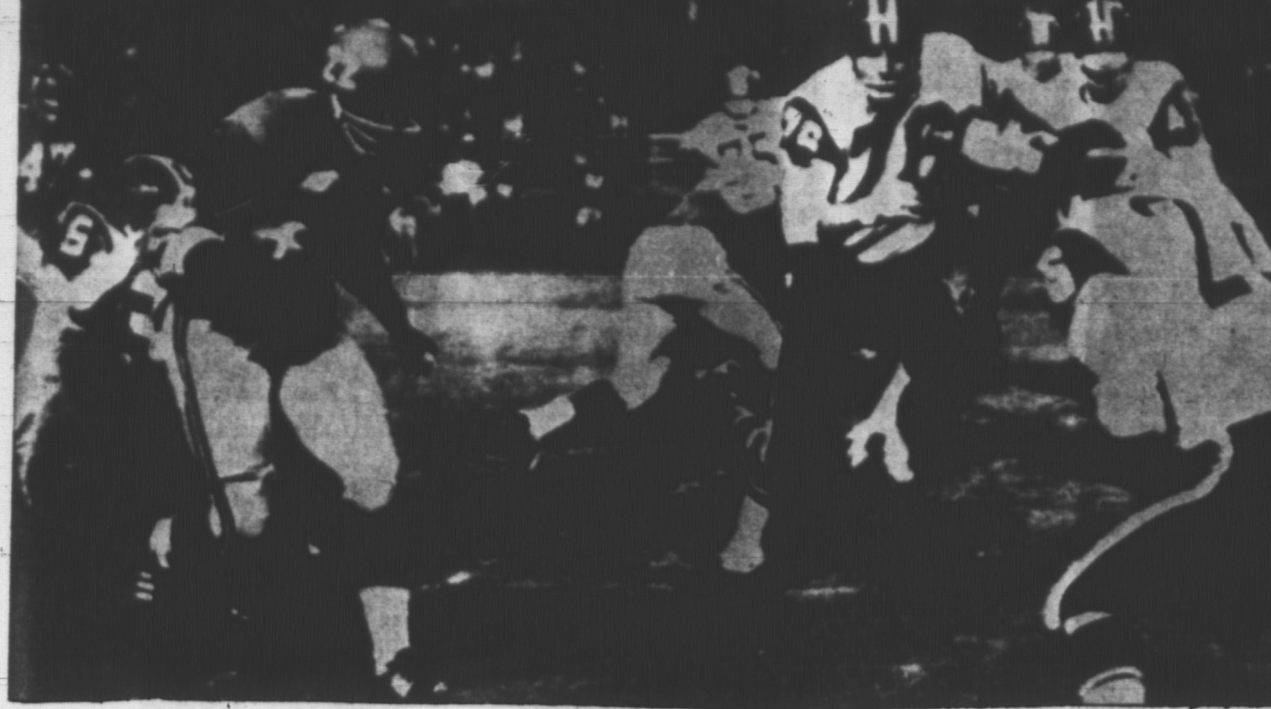

Giant's Juan Marichal Threatens Koufax's ERA

By BEN GLAN NEW YORK (AP) — Juan Marichal, ace right-hander with San Francisco Giants, is threatening to end Sandy Koufax's three-year reign as National League earned run champion.

The latest averages showed Tuesday that Marichal paces the league with a 1.60 earned run average followed by Vernon Law of Pittsburgh Pirates with 1.89. Koufax, star southpaw with Los Angeles Dodgers, is third at 2.07.

Reliever Eddie Fisher of Chicago White Sox is the American League leader with a 1.87. Milt Pappas of Baltimore Orioles is the runner-up with 1.97.

Marichal, the major league leader in shutouts with eight, has given up only 35 earned runs in 197 innings while posting a 16-8 record. He has blanked New York Mets three times and Cincinnati Reds, Los Angeles, Chicago, Philadelphia Phillies and Houston Astros once each.

Law, who has an 11-9 record, has yielded 33 earned runs in 157 innings. The veteran right-hander has three shutouts.

Koufax, 18-4, has worked 213 innings and given up 49 earned runs. He has three shutouts and leads the league in strikeouts with 241. Koufax was the ERA title-holder in 1962 with 2.54, in 1963 with 1.88 and last season with 1.74.

Bob Shaw of San Francisco is fourth in the National League with a 2.30 ERA. Then comes Dick Farrell, Houston, 2.60. Claude Osteen, Los Angeles, 2.65, and Don Drysdale, another Dodger, 2.57.

The current leaders are based on a minimum of 100 innings pitched. To qualify for a major league earned run crown a pitcher must work at least 163 innings.

Fisher, an 11-game winner, has pitched in 53 games, all in relief. The knuckleballing right-hander has permitted 22 earned runs in 106 innings.

Pappas has given up 32 unearned runs in 145 frames. He has won 10 games, including two shutouts, both against the White Sox.

S. A. M. McDowell, Cleveland Indians' young fireballer, is third in the American League with 2.10. George Brunet of Los Angeles Angels is fourth at 2.19.

Dean Chance of the Angels, winner of last year's AL title with 1.56, has a 4.02 earned run mark this season. He has won only seven games and lost eight.

Jaroslav Kappil of the Czechoslovakian team dropped out of the race because of exhaustion aggravated by an injury.

Lion's Quarterback Kapp Is Jack Of Many Trades

By JACK BRAUCKMANN VANCOUVER (CP) — Joe Kapp has more sidelines than a football field.

The reigning king of Canadian quarterbacks is a rising young executive in the off-the-field world of business—a world in which youngsters see him as much a peanut butter pusher as a star athlete.

The image in kids' minds is not accidental. It is the culmination of a carefully planned, well-organized program to make football and peanut butter almost synonymous in the youngsters' subconscious.

The peanut butter public relations program is handled by a company called Joe Kapp Ltd., a company that also promotes automobiles and has, in the past, pushed a hair dressing purporting to be the antithesis of "greasy kid stuff."

Joe Kapp at 25 is still a fledgling in the business world, an outstanding football player whose name is worth money to promotion-minded companies with a product to market.

At the same time the British Columbia Lions' signal-caller is a young man looking for a secure future, for the time when his arm can no longer throw touchdown passes and his name ceases to be a commodity.

FOOTBALL PAYS WELL "I don't know exactly what my future in business will be, any more than I can predict what the years will bring in my football career," he says.

"But I can tell you one thing: If a young man can put as much energy and dedication into a business career as he does in making the grade in pro football, he'll do all right."

Kapp's biggest endeavor is the peanut butter promotion and he makes more than 100 personal appearances in the off-season on behalf of the spread. The majority of these appearances are before groups of youngsters—mainly football, baseball and hockey leaguers.

He reacts almost violently to the suggestion he is pandering when he comes in the name of a peanut butter brand and talks sportsmanship to the kids.
