Picture Hungry Millions At Montreal Conference

By FORBES RHUDE Canadian Press Business Editor MONTREAL (CP)—Millions of hungry people Monday marched through the lush meeting place of the Commonwealth trade and economic conference.

They weren't there in person but in the words and tones—generally sober, sometimes eloquent and always cultured—of the delegates who represented them.

Another army also marched through the meeting place. This one bore stocks of food which could feed the hungry people and stocks of raw materials which could be fashioned into things which would improve their way of life.

Neither was this army present in person—nor its cargoes of wheat, its stocks of butter, nor its ingots of metals.

It, too, was there in the words of delegates from countries which are feeling recession because they have found no way to market their goods in sufficient quantities.

BUT HOW? Missing was a practical and effective way of bringing together the armies of want and the armies of wealth.

To find such a way is one of the great objects of the present

conference. On its ability to reach such an objective will rest in large measure its success or failure, and perhaps the future of the Commonwealth as a continuing entity.

It was easy to forget these things in the luxury of the Queen Elizabeth Hotel, Canada's newest showplace of comfort and abundant food.

But they were there in the words of country after country whose peoples are seeking to emerge into a better way of life.

In this, the conference consists of two types. There are such countries as the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa which—though they have their economic problems—have achieved for their peoples a high standard of living.

And there are the countries of Asia and Africa which have yet to develop their resources to the highest good of their peoples and who need help to do so.

Appeals for such help were made in polite phrases and at least some encouragement was given by representatives of the more highly developed Commonwealth countries.

A HINT OF ICE Morarji Desai, India's minister

of finance, paid tribute to what has been done through such things as the Colombo Plan, but there seemed to be a hint of ice in his voice as he added:

"Neither the world nor the Commonwealth can continue to march forward if some countries and their peoples have nothing but poverty and stagnation to look forward to. I am glad that the importance of the more industrialized members of the Commonwealth assisting in this process, is being recognized more and more."
