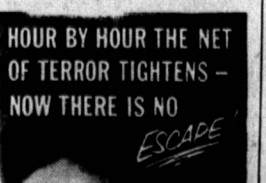

PROVINCIAL VOCATIONAL SCHOOL CHARLOTTETOWN Offers Two Youth Training Short Courses

For Young Men and Young Women in AGRICULTURE and EGG GRADING COMMENCING THE LATTER PART OF FEBRUARY, 1957

Young men and young women 16 years of age or older are eligible to attend.

Those who must live away from home while receiving instruction, and who satisfactorily complete the courses will receive financial assistance to the extent of \$6.00 per week.

AGRICULTURE—This (day) course lasting from four to six weeks includes instruction in Animal Health, Animal Husbandry, Field Crops and other topics of interest.

EGG GRADING—This (day) course lasting from three to four weeks is designed to train young men and young women in the operation and management of Egg Grading Stations. Instruction is given in Grading of Eggs, Use of Equipment, Keeping Records and Government Regulations.

Egyptians Have Reorganized Camel Corps, Ignore Equipment

By JACK BRAYLEY Canadian Press Staff Writer PORT SAID, Egypt (CP)—Egyptians have noticed sharp contrasts in the makeup of the average Egyptian. He will spare no effort to hustle some inconsequential trinket on the street but he seems to be a great procrastinator when it comes to getting down to the hard work of organizing an efficient working economy.

A Canadian officer gave an illustration of this national characteristic. The Egyptian Army went to great pains to round up and refurbish its antiquated camel corps that strayed and broke up in the invasion. They have them back in spit and polish order at a time when modern Russian tanks, armored vehicles and trucks lie neglected at the side of the road, needing in some cases only a minimum of repair to put them back in service.

Rail lines are still disrupted by the broken canal bridges and sand has piled up over unused stretches of the line. EASY PHILOSOPHY As a friendly and philosophical Egyptian remarked, the most common word in an Egyptian's vocabulary is roughly "tomorrow," which means something will be done tomorrow, next week or next month.

But out along the highways and beside the Sweetwater Canal which provides bathing and water supply facilities at one and the same time you find a friendly peasant who gives you a big welcome grin and obviously is unconcerned by the passing events which have seen little change in his standard of life in 2,000 years. He wears the same clothes, irrigates his fields with the same primitive water wheel turned by a Buffalo, uses a camel or donkey depending on the length of the journey and load, and lives in squalor in a mud hut.

CHANGE COMING But at the same time he has a dignity and there are definite signs that he wants to learn and to improve his lot. The government is planning a big economic, educational and industrial program and there are indications of a cultural and economic awakening in the land.

Town planning is also being introduced. Each city has a group of substantial buildings surrounded by a slum of mud huts and shacks. You get the impression the town has a population of only about 50,000 because you don't see immediately or take into account the crowded conditions of the slum. The population generally turns out to be 100,000.

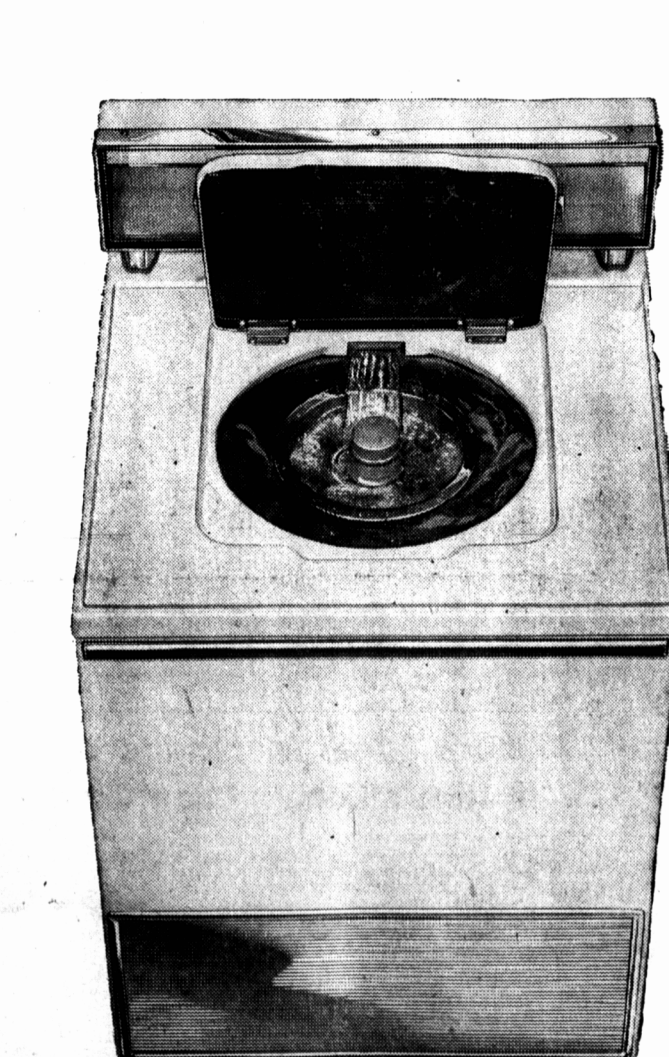
