LONDON, Dec 1.—The Daily Chronicle, publishes what it calls "startling information":—"Russia," it says, "has decided to establish a permanent diplomatic agency in Cabul next spring. The Amer's consent has been obtained, and pour parlars have been exchanged between Count Muravieff and Great Britain who is not likely to oppose the step."

Killed and Wounded.

LONDON, Nov. 30.—A revised list of the British casualties at Belmont shows:—Officers killed, 4; wounded, 22; non-commissioned officers and privates killed, 46; wounded, 225, of which number the Guards had 35 killed and 159 wounded. The revised list of casualties sustained by General Hildyard's forces in their sortie from Estcourt, Natal, at Beacon hill, shows:—Killed 13; wounded, 64; missing, 1; prisoners, 8.

A Canadian company, accordingly, has been formed with a capital of \$2,500,000 to take over for Canada all the manufacturing rights of the concerns incorporated in the American Bicycle Company. That is, the American Bicycle Company's several varieties of wheels will no longer come from the United States to Canada, ready made by American labor, but will be made here by a company of our own, employing Canadians in their works.
