"We firmly believe that man is still the first weapon, the most important," said R.E.R. Admiral Kenneth L. Dyer, DSC, CD, RCN, Flag Officer Atlantic Coast last night as he spoke at the banquet of the Naval Officers' Club, held in the Charlottetown Hotel.

## New City School Nearly Complete

Construction on the new Queen Square School is reaching the completion stage, with the installation of light fixtures and hardware and painting, now in progress.

All plumbing has been completed, and work in most mechanical trades is finished in the two storey structure, with the exception of the electrician.

**PAINTERS AT WORK**  
Painters are at work in the classrooms, doing the walls in each room in a separate combination of pastel colors. Doors to each room stand out in light colored hallways in muted shades of bright reds, yellows, blues and greens.

The laying of tile will be the last work to be done in the interior.

Classified as a 31-classroom structure, the school will not actually have that number of classes, for various other rooms are included in this number. A passageway connects the new building with the Community Centre, which will serve as a recreation centre for the school.
