Private Fishing Property Case Is Before Magistrate

A resident of Bristol was before the Magistrate's Court in Souris Wednesday, charged with fishing on a private fishing property. His defence is that he was standing on his own land which has recently been covered with water. He is owner of property at Bristol which extends to a mill pond which had been allowed to go out and which has been newly dammed by Willard Jordan, Gordon Hughes and Norman MacLeod. The charge was brought by chief game warden Spurgeon Jenkins on the basis that the Minister of Industry and Natural Resources had approved their improvements to fishing conditions on property in their possession and granted the right to enclose it. The case was adjourned until May 16 without all the evidence being completed. Mr. N.W. Lowther, Q.C., is acting for the accused. Mr. J.P. Nicholson, for the Crown in that case and all the other cases coming before Magistrate G.A. Gaudet at Wednesday's sitting. A resident of Souris and a resident of Souris Line Road were each fined \$25 and costs or 30 days for possession of liquor not purchased from a Vendor. A resident of Souris River was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days for being intoxicated in a public place. A resident of Souris was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days for causing a disturbance. Under the Game Act a resident of Souris was fined \$5 and costs or 10 days for fishing without a license. A resident of Charlottetown was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days for possession of liquor elsewhere than in his residence. A charge under the Migratory Bird Act against a resident of Souris was adjourned until May 16 after a plea of not guilty. A charge of possession of liquor not purchased on his individual permit, against a resident of Bristol, was dismissed. Mr. Melvin J. McQuaid was counsel for the accused. Commissioners of St. Peter's village had a list of 11 tax defaulters, judgment going against eight by default. The remaining three were set down for hearing May 16.

French Fakir Claims Record

LILLE, France (Reuters)—Yvon Yva, a 25-year-old French fakir, has claimed a world's record after being buried alive for 28 1/2 hours. The fakir, clad only in a white turban and a loincloth, was lifted

from his temporary grave in a public hall here Tuesday night. He was breathing weakly and on the point of collapse.

Wednesday, as he drank lemonade and chewed almonds, he commented: "I shall be a vegetarian from now on. I have eaten meat in the past and this hampered me while setting the world record."

He told reporters that he had been beaten by 37 hours the previous world record set by a German in Dortmund in 1951. On April 29, Yva was sealed in a wooden coffin, with only two bottles of lemonade and cold unsweetened tea for sustenance, and buried in a 10-foot grave. Hundreds of people came to the hall to look down a peepscope into the coffin.

MONROVIA, Liberia (Reuters)—President William Tubman of Liberia has turned down a Soviet invitation to visit Russia, it was announced Wednesday. Clarence Lorenzo Simpson, Liberian ambassador to Britain, who conveyed the Soviet invitation to President Tubman, said the president had replied he had other commitments and could not accept.
