



DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

They are starting to step along at the Charlottetown track. The past week the season's pacing mark was set at 2:15 2/5 by Silk Hat 2:09 1/5, driven by Dave Wisener. Joseph Clipper 2:08 1/5, driven by Roach MacGregor, finished on the outside half a length back, and Argot Pointer 2:07, with Dr. Seaman up, was a length behind. Yesterday morning a new season's trotting record was set up by Armyway 2:17, that finished the mile in 2:14 2/5 with Pet Hanover 2:17 2/5 a length back. Both are owned by Roy Bevan and are in the stable of Roach MacGregor. Other than the above there have been a lot of miles paced or trotted in from 2:20 to 2:25 and next week will no doubt see a few seconds shaved off the above workouts. More horses are coming to the track every day and on opening night, June 28th, it is expected that 75 or more will be stabled there.

Colonel Jim Calkin of Woodstock writes that they now have fifty head stabled at Island Park track, all taking their training to perfection. The latest arrival is Real Fingo, owned by Arthur McGee of Augusta, Maine, and a member of Jimmie Smith's stable which consists of 20 head.

Ten dashes were raced at Truro on June 9th, the Queen's birthday. The track was very heavy due to continued rains and there was a shower just before the start of the races. However, some very good time was made with the trotter Mack Fingo 2:15 (F. Moreside) winning the 5th dash in 2:17. Luscilia 2:13 (K. Pinkney) was second and King Gratton 2:19 3/5 (E. Haley) third. The next fastest heat was the 6th dash, Classified Trot and Pace, the trotter King Wyn 2:10 1/5 with driver Haley, finished first but was set back to 3rd place for performing at a mixed gait and the heat awarded to Nova G. 2:14 2/5, owned by Mrs. Elizabeth Weeks, Port Wallis, and driven by Scott Weeks. Second place went to Gary D. 2:16 4/5, owned and driven by P. Craig, Lower Sackville.

Other winners were Protector's Boy, owned and driven by Phil Craig, in 2:22 1/5—a new record—and 2:27 4/5. The pacer Cattie Lee, driven by A. Gould, was second and Jimmie Clegg (Daniels) third. Buzzaway, a three-year-old by Pepper, won a dash for owner-driver George Turner of Dartmouth, in 2:30 4/5, and Pepper Boy, by Pepper owned by George Turner and driven by Johnny Conroy, won the 4th dash in 2:29 2/5. They had no records previously. Mason's 49, owned and driven by Laurie O'Brien, won the 3rd dash in 2:24 2/5 and the 8th dash in 2:20 4/5, just three-fifths of a second off his record of 2:20 1/5. The 9th dash was won by Luscilia 2:13, owned and driven by K. Pinkney in 2:22 2/5, and the 10th dash by Alice T. Clegg 2:15, owned by B. A. Taylor, Aylesworth, in 2:21 3/5.

The many friends of Lloyd Palmer, now a resident of Moncton, will read with interest this little note from him:—"Paper Girl foaled on May 26th a lovely little filly by Pepper, by Volomite. I was over to see it the weekend of the 24th of May. They are both as my uncle's at Port Hill. I am going to have the foal registered right away. What do you think of All Spice for a name? ... A very nice name, Lloyd, we think. Paper Girl was bought with money which Lloyd earned selling papers. He was a most likeable boy and was very popular at the race track, in fact everywhere he went.

And now a letter from Thane Belyea of Fredericton, N.B.:—"I was down to Gagetown last week and saw Percy Bridges' yearling by Federal out of Dawn McKillop. He calls him Federal Don and he is a

beautiful looking colt. The mare is in foal to Widow's Pride 2, 2:06. She looks great and is a splendid type of brood mare. Percy was the former owner of Hanover Courrier 2:11, raced for several years by Johnny Conroy. The John E. Forbes stable will be shipping to Woodstock about the 20th of June. The weather has been so bad here that the horses are not very far advanced. The best mile in this stable has been around 2:23. The colt Teenie's Pal by Pagliacci 2:06 1/2, which I told you about in my last letter, had a tumor weighing 11 pounds and the vets said he could not get better and ordered him destroyed. He showed good last year as a two-year-old. Thanks, Thane.

A former Islander, H.B. MacLeod of Kensington Place, High River, Alberta, is a guest at the Charlottetown Hotel. He went west 43 years ago and the great open spaces have been very kind to him. He is the owner of an extensive ranch and raises some magnificent cattle. He is also a lover of horses and there are quite a number of good trotters and pacers in his vicinity. We had the pleasure of a short conversation with him and found that our former friends, Fred Blake and Charlie Farquharson, are among the prominent citizens of High River. H.B. previously spent two weeks in Summerside and Kensington and will return next week bringing back to the far west in a new Dodge truck two well-bred pacers. One is a yearling by Pagliacci 2:09 1/2, dam that great pacer, mare of years ago, Betty S. 2:07, that Cecil Alexander brought here from Ohio and which was a frequent winner over Maritime tracks. The others is a three-year-old pacer, dam, Betty Clegg 2:04 1/2, purchased from Barney Hynes of Emerald. He is a very handsome colt, good gaited and clever in every way. Mr. MacLeod had several drives behind this colt prior to coming to Charlottetown. He and his family are lovers of horses and his youngest daughter, Muriel, a high school girl, has three riding horses, one of them out of an Arabian pony that was bought by the Duke of Windsor and brought from his farm in England. We hope that Mr. MacLeod will have the best of success with his purchases and that it will encourage other former Islanders in High River and vicinity to come here and buy our well-bred colts.

His foxes have been cut down considerably but he has a respectable number of them also, but that day George's ideas were all on horses and as we were nearing his place we noticed a beautiful chestnut with one white front leg and one white hind leg, being exercised by his trainer. If Sunday afternoon's baseball game between the Junior Abbies and Maritime Central Airways is half as good as that played between the two teams last Tuesday evening it will still be a good ball game. We don't expect to see any no-hitters pitched, these only occur once in every blue moon. However, we think that there should be another good pitchers battle and there should not be too much difference in the score between the two squads.

Young Lorne MacDougall may be making his first start on the mound for the Junior Abbies. Lorne has looked pretty good in the little that we have seen of him this spring. He has only pitched two innings in regular league play this year and these have been in relief. His fastball, however, will give the M.C.A. batters plenty of trouble. If coach Ev. MacNeill does not start MacDougall he will call upon Donnie "No-Hit" MacLean to face the Airways swingers again.

The second game of the afternoon will bring together the undefeated B.C.A.F. team and the Abbie Intermediates. This year's edition of the airmen's team is supposed to be the strongest that ever represented the Summerside Station. They have made only two starts and have been victorious both times, having gained wins over the Junior Abbies and Holman's Intermediates. Sunday afternoon will mark their first appearance in Charlottetown. The game is an important one as it is one of these four point affairs.

The Glace Bay Miners are not standing still reports Aubrey Keizer in the Sydney Post Record. Writes Keizer: "Reports from a reliable source are to the effect that the selection of a new coach to replace popular 'Bud' Polle is already underway. Officials of the Abegweit Club, anxious to get ready for the track and field meets this summer, have ordered a practice for all interested athletes on Monday evening. Coaching the Abbies track and field hopefuls will be Bill Halpenny one of the best pole vaulters that ever came out of the Maritimes. Halpenny is one of the few athletes from this province who ever participated in the Olympics and the Abegweit officials feel fortunate that they were able to secure his services.

Earlier this spring it had been planned to hold meets in the province every two weeks and as far as we know these plans still hold. In addition there will be three major meets for members of the Abbies team. On July 1 there will be a Memorial Day meet here at which it is hoped to have representatives from clubs across the Maritimes. In mid-July the Highland games will be held at Antigonish while on Labor Day the Maritime Championships will be staged here.

Managing the Abbies team will be Ev. Cutcliffe. 24-year-old Ev, who has done considerable distance running for the Abbies, stated last night that he plans to retire this year and devote his spare time to helping the youngsters. Cutcliffe is a strong track and field enthusiast and he believes that track and field athletes will be in for a good summer.

Ev expressed some regret over the fact that Billy Purcell gave up track for baseball. He figured that Purcell had more natural track ability than any other boy of a similar age that he ever saw. Billy now is playing baseball for Curran and Briggs in Summerside and getting along very well as his 358 batting average testifies. It is possible that he may do some running for the Abbies this year.

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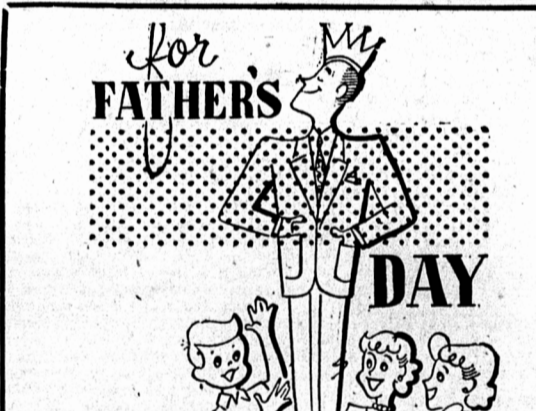

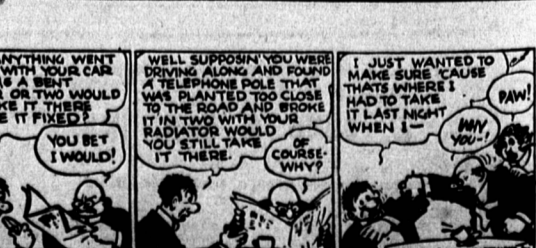
