

Rangers Blank Leafs 6-0; Black Hawks Halt Bruins

NEW YORK (AP) — Jimmy Bartlett scored three goals and rookie Bob Kabel, making his Madison Square Garden debut, collected a pair to power New York Rangers to a 6-0 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs Sunday night. The triumph snapped the Leafs' six-game National Hockey League undefeated streak and was the Rangers' first win over Toronto in six games this season.

New York goalie Marcel Paille, backed by a sturdy defence, posted his first shutout of the campaign and the second of his big league career. The stubby netminder made 30 saves, several on the spectacular side.

But Paille had to share the hero roles with Bartlett and Kabel. Bartlett's hat trick was his first ever in an NHL game while Kabel's goals were his first ever in big league competition.

Kabel, playing his third game

since being brought up from Vancouver of the Western League, ignited New York with a 10-footer that found the mark after just 20 seconds of the opening period.

Captain Red Sullivan converted a rebound at 13:51 of the first stanza and Kabel whipped in the angle shot at 17:25 to make it 3-0.

BOSTON (AP) — Chicago's Bobby Hull scored three goals Sunday night to lead his Black Hawks teammates to a 6-3 National Hockey League rout of Boston Bruins.

Bill Hay, Ken Wharram and Ted Lindsay accounted for the other Chicago goals.

Don McKenney, Doug Mohs and Guy Gendron scored for the Bruins.

Hull, a 20-year-old who is playing his third season in the league; got one in each period but got some help on his first two.

On his first shot he was passing from the corner when Boston's Leo Boivin hit the puck in the air with his stick, deflecting it into the Bruins' net.

Hull's second goal, the only one scored in the second period, was a 35-foot shot which glanced off the skate of Leo Labine and passed the surprised Harry Lumley. His third was more legitimate, a smart flip over two sprawled defenders.

It spoiled a great comeback by the runaway league-leaders, who displayed only spurts of their top form as the Wings shot out to a 3-1 lead.

The Canadiens barged from behind and captured a 4-3 lead, scoring three times in a span of two minutes and 32 seconds of the middle period. The contest was more than half over when the Canadiens shook out of the doldrums.

Ralph Backstrom, Andre Pronovost and Claude Provost whipped shots past Terry Sawchuk. Backstrom scored on a 20-footer, Pronovost on a mistake by Sawchuk and Provost on a rebound.

Pronovost's goal came when Sawchuk wandered out of the net to try to brush away a puck from in front. He missed it, and Pronovost had an easy tap-in.

Montreal scored first on Jean Beliveau's power play goal early in the opening period. Big Jean beat Sawchuk with a low shot.

The Wings tied it late in the period on a power play goal by rookie Murray Oliver. It came 61

seconds after Jean Guy Talbot went to the penalty box or holding.

Oliver shoved the Wings ahead early in the second period when he tapped in Marcel Pronovost's shot at the front of the cage. Red Kelly made it 3-1, even with the Red Wings shorthanded.

N.Y. Giants Clinch Crown; Colts Down 49ers 34-14

The New York Giants, cutting loose with an awesome display of aerial power triggered by Charlie Connerly, wrapped up their second straight Eastern Conference title in the National Football League Sunday with almost unbelievable ease.

The Giants, with their offense rolling in high for the third straight week and the defense throttling all but one Cleveland scoring threat, whipped the Browns 48-7 for their ninth victory in 11 games. They hold a two-game margin over the Philadelphia Eagles.

The regular season ends next Sunday. Baltimore's Colts, who defeated the Giants 23-17 in overtime in last year's title game, assured

themselves of no worse than a tie for the Western Conference title Saturday by turning back the 49ers at San Francisco 34-14. The Colts need only a tie with Los Angeles next Saturday to qualify as the Giants' opponents.

COULD BE A TIE

Should the Colts slip, however, the 49ers and the Chicago Bears are in a position to create a tie. The Bears (7-4) tied the 49ers for second Saturday by downing the Pittsburgh Steelers 27-21. The Bears wind up against Detroit and the 49ers against Green Bay.

In other games, the Eagles jumped over Cleveland into second place in the Eastern Division with a 34-14 decision over Washington and Detroit beat the Chicago Cardinals 45-21.

The Giants, with Conery throwing three touchdown passes and Don Heinrich one, ran and passed for a net gain of 526 yards to Ceveand's 146. New York passed for 401 yards with 23 completions in 40 attempts. Frank Gifford carried nine times for 46 yards and scored two touchdowns, one on a 32-yard aerial from Conery.

The Giants' score was their largest in five years and the second worst beating ever handed the Browns. Ceveand didn't get on the scoreboard until the fourth when Bobby Mitchell returned a punt 78 yards for a TD. Jimmy Brown, Cleveland's great fullback was injured in the first quarter and didn't return to action until the third period.

The Green Bay Packers, in fourth place in the Western Divi-

sion, scored 28 points in the first half at Los Angeles and went on to win 30-23, burying the Rams deeper in the cellar.

Paul Hornung and Bart Starr, packer quarterbacks, sparked in the Green Bay victory. Hornung passed to end Boyd Dowler for two touchdowns, one 26 yards and the other 30 yards. Hornung also kicked five conversions and a 23-yard field goal. Starr passed 13 yards to Jim Taylor for the first Packer touchdown.

British Rugger Patrons Are Crying Too Much 'Foot'

LONDON (CP)—In Canada the old-timers complain that they've taken the foot out of football. In British rugger, they're beginning to wonder if they aren't seeing too much of it.

A case in point occurred in Cardiff, when Newport protected an unbeaten record by beating the home side 12-8 with all their scoring coming from four penalty goals by Norman Morgan. Cardiff's points came from a penalty goal and a converted try.

There was no denying the merits of Morgan's feat. His longest shot travelled 65 yards. Another 50-yarder was kicked from a spot just inside the touch line. But it happened on an afternoon when his foot appeared to be the only offensive weapon in Newport's locker.

The question, which is being asked with increasing frequency, involves the wisdom of awarding three points for a penalty goal, often the result of a trifling infraction of the rules, when the same reward comes from crossing the opposing goal line.

international match in three years. The suggested remedies follow two lines—reduction of the number of offences punishable by the award of a penalty kick and a change in the scoring setup to emphasize the value of a touchdown.

The most popular suggestion for revision of the point-scoring regulations is a step in the direction of North American football, increasing the try from three points to four and reducing the convert from two to one. The alternative would be to drop the penalty goal in value from three points to two.

The problem of changing the rules on penalty awards is more complex. Rugger is a game with few written regulations and a great deal of discretion resting with the individual referee. Many officials already make a practice of calling penalties for minor offences only when the ball is well out of range of the goal posts.

FEAR RELAXATION

Rugger experts say a strict official could call a penalty for off-side or illegal bodily contact almost every time two players collide. But defenders of the present rules argue that any relaxation of the penalty rule could easily lead to abuses and excessive rough play.

The case for reform is put succinctly by Wilfred Wooller, a former Welsh international and, incidentally, a goal-kicking specialist, who now writes a column for The News Chronicle.

"Legislators should be moulding the hands, not the feet of the growing child," he says.

"Rugby began as a great contest of brain and muscle when players learned to run and pass

The Red Wings edged Bruins 4-3, X-rays were being taken of the toe injury Sunday.

Meanwhile, in Montreal the Canadiens, who lost defenceman Tom Johnson for at least a week with a shoulder separation Thursday night, lost winger Marcel Bonin Saturday. He suffered a recurrence of a previous back injury in the first period of a game against Chicago Black Hawks and did not make the trip to Detroit Sunday.

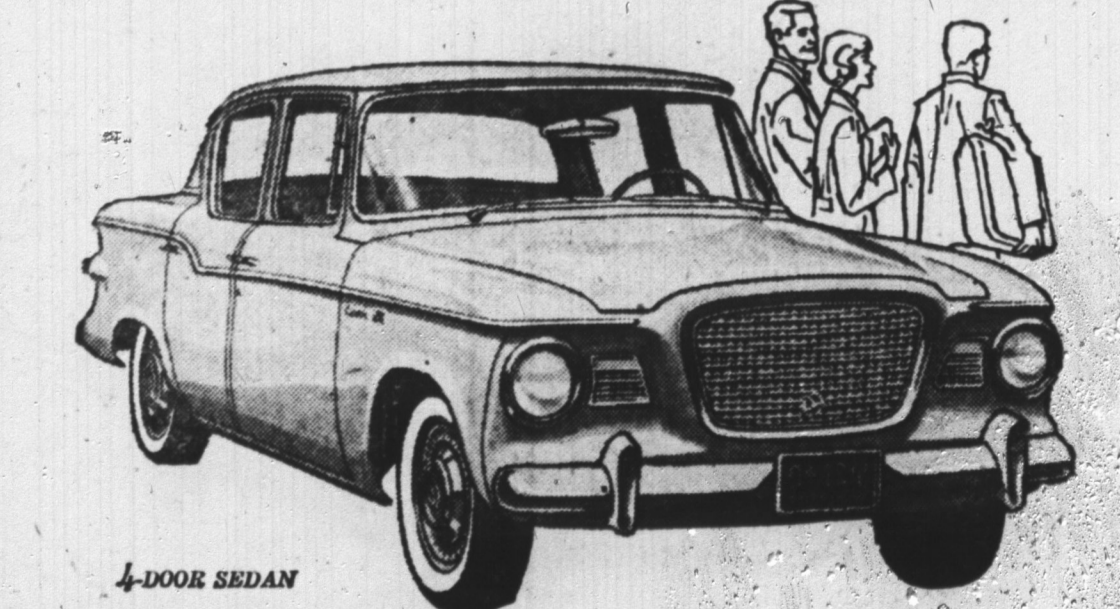
