

Street And Park Breastwork Repairs Progressing Rapidly

Attractive New Store Front At Moore & McLeod's

Workmen were busy yesterday removing the housing in front of Moore and McLeod's store on Queen Street, enabling shoppers on that busy highway to see just what was going on behind the scenes for the past several months. The new front consists of three 8-foot show windows, one 12-foot show window and a recess window four feet wide which continues on into the store for 8 feet. This recess is to be devoted exclusively to the showing of men's wear. The basement entrance is at the left of the main entrance. The windows are set in Aluminite finish frames, and are all metal, as are also the doors.

The colour scheme of the interior is dominated by neutral gray, and the various departments are highlighted by distinguishing colours adapted to make a harmonious and complete whole. Primrose Yellow, Coral Rose and Blue Green have been skilfully blended to achieve the desired effect. Many new fixtures have been added, all finished in lined oak, which with the added colours of the commodities on display, under the 58 ceiling fixtures, with Louvre openings, give the whole store an appearance rarely excelled in the most exclusive stores in any large city. It is understood that the grand re-opening of this splendid store will take place in a few days.

Ottawa Official Stresses Need Of More Farm Labour

Mr. H. M. Grant of Halifax, Superintendent Atlantic District, Department of Citizenship and Immigration, has arrived in Charlottetown on departmental business. Mr. Grant is accompanied by immigration inspector, V. K. Chisholm. The two officials visited Summerside yesterday, and enroute called at a number of farms where immigrants had been placed. Mr. Grant's district includes Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island, but not New Brunswick. He reports that immigrants are arriving from Europe quite briskly, and that many of these are destined to fill vacancies on farms throughout Canada.

There is a great need for farm labourers, and the supply from Europe will hardly meet the demand, Mr. Grant states there is considerable movement of skilled workers from Great Britain and the northern European countries. Skilled workers are only brought over to areas where shortages exist. This is Mr. Grant's second visit to the Province, and his first visit during the summer-time. He has been greatly impressed with the beauty of the Island, and the high state of cultivation of its farm lands.

Annual Meeting Third Queens Conservatives

Mr. Louis MacDonald of Bedford was re-elected president of the Third Queens Progressive Conservative Association at the annual meeting at Winston Hall last night. The meeting was largely attended. Other officers include vice-president, Leith Brown, York; secretary-treasurer Charles H. Phillips, Harrington; conveners, Herbert Beagan, Johnston; River and Leith Brown, York.

A vote of thanks was tendered the retiring secretary, R. A. MacDonald of Mt. Stewart, for his untiring services during the past six years.

Speakers included Provincial Party Leader R. B. Bell, Capt. J. J. MacDonald, Glenfinnan, Major Andrew MacRae, Winsloe, Forrest E. Clow, Charlottetown, Reagh Bagnall, provincial president, Hunter River, and Mrs. W. H. V. Dunbar, Fifth Queens women's organization president, Charlottetown. Five resolutions were adopted unanimously. They expressed deep regret at the death of King George VI; pledged loyalty to Queen Elizabeth; expressed appreciation of the work being done by Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, former leader, and by Messrs. W.C.S. McLeure, M.P., and J. Angus MacLean; affirmed support and confidence in Provincial leader Bell, and Federal leader George Drew; and supported the principle of clean elections and viewed with hope the success of the Progressive Conservative candidates in recent federal by-elections. It was also agreed that there should be an equal improvement in the wages paid on large and sustained government projects. Mr. Pettigrove completed his survey in Summerside last Monday and expects to be in Charlottetown for several days in order to meet all concerned with local basic wage matters.

First Roadside Table For Tourists Now In Operation

Prince Edward Island's first roadside table, one of two being placed along Provincial highways this year, has been set up at a picturesque point on the Pinette River between Charlottetown and the Wood Islands ferry. It has been announced by Mr. George V. Fraser, Director of the Provincial Government Tourist and Information Bureau. This is one of seven new projects being undertaken this year by the Bureau to make the Island a more attractive place for tourists to visit, he said.

Other projects arranged by Mr. Fraser for the 1952 season include: an attractive window display which will run through the month of August in the Canadian Government Travel Bureau's New York display window; new, large directional and mileage signs which have been placed from Aulac, New Brunswick to the Island; and a large display of large flower boxes around the Island Information Bureau at Aulac; a revolving art exhibition at the Aulac

Bureau which will be featured starting July 1; a survey of visitors to be conducted on the ferries operating between the province and the mainland, and the commencement of a ragweed elimination program.

The roadside tables were built during the winter months through the cooperation of the forestry division of the Department of Industry and Natural Resources, the Vocational School and the Department of Public Works and Highways. They were built on the same plan as that which is used in neighboring provinces. Site of the second table which will be put out this year has not been definitely decided as yet but it will likely be on Highway 2 between Charlottetown and the Borden ferry terminal. Additional tables will be built next winter for other routes. Large signs will be placed along the highways 1,000 feet on either side of the roadside tables to notify passing motorists of their location.

Fine Turnout Yesterday By The RECCE Regiment

In one of its finest turn-outs in post war years the Prince Edward Island Regiment (17th Recce) paraded at the Ordnance Grounds last night. The occasion was the annual Pre Camp Day, Regimental smoker and lobster supper.

The Commanding Officer, Lt.-Col. A.W. Rogers, inspected the Unit and later took the salute on a march past following a parade at Victoria Park. The parade was commanded by second-in-command, Major J.A. MacDonald, E.D. The Regiment will proceed to Camp Utopia July 12th for seven days concentrated training. Originally the Unit was allotted 20 officers and 50 other ranks, but it is expected to exceed this. There were over 150 all ranks on parade last night.

The colorful Regimental Band took part in the ceremonies under the direction of Bandmaster W.O.I. Tom MacFarlane. Headquarters and all three squadrons turned in a splendid show and were complimented by the O.C. Some indication of the esprit de corps and success of the Unit has attained was noticeable in that there were over a dozen recruits awaiting an opportunity to join last night.

"A" Squadron from Charlottetown and vicinity is commanded by Major E.K. Kennedy; "B" Squadron from the Kings County centres of Souris, St. Peters, Morrell, Mt. Stewart and Georgetown is commanded by Major R.J. Mahar, E.D.; "C" Squadron from Summerside is commanded by Major F.J. MacNeill, Headquarters Squadron from Charlottetown and Kensington is commanded by Major G.L. Monkley; Adjutant is Capt. L.G. MacNevin.

The parade was formed up by Regimental Sergeant Major E.A. Jessome. At St. Dunstan's Basilica High Mass will be celebrated by Reverend E. F. Bolger and the sermon will be preached by Reverend R. G. Ellsworth, at Trinity United Church, by Capt. Gordon Darrach, recently returned from duty in Western Command, will preach the special sermon, supported in the pulpit by other Protestant Chaplains of the area. The parade will form up in the vicinity of the Charlottetown Armouries and proceed along Kent Street to Prince Street, then down Prince Street where the Roman Catholic party will proceed by Richmond Street to the Basilica and the Protestant parade will enter Trinity United Church. On the return march the parade will move along Kent Street past the Provincial Building where His Honor Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse will take the salute on the march past, then along Queen Street to Kent Street and down Kent Street to the Armouries.

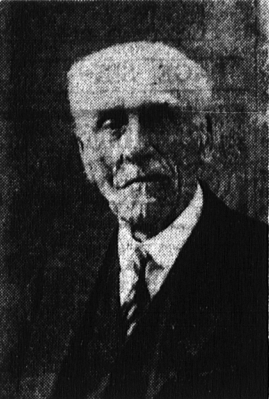

Will Observe 96th Birthday Anniversary



Mr. George A. Hughes, veteran railwayman and chief train dispatcher at Charlottetown for many years, expects to celebrate his 96th birthday quietly with his family today.

Born at Georgetown on June 26th, 1856, Mr. Hughes grew up with the telegraph, railway and telephone services as they were inaugurated and developed in this Province. He retired from the Railway with forty-two years of service to his credit and was presented with the Imperial Service Medal in recognition of his long and faithful service, which is a decoration from the reigning Sovereign to former employees of the Canadian Government Railways. Subsequently Mr. Hughes was presented with a life membership in the Order of Railroad Telegraphers, having completed 45 years of continuous membership. In June 1945, a further honour was conferred on Mr. Hughes when he was made a life member of the Board of Trustees of Trinity United Church.

German Immigrants Scheduled To Arrive Here This Evening

Ten German immigrants from West Germany are expected to arrive in the Province tonight. Five of these will be placed in Prince County and the remainder in Queen's and King's Counties. These men are coming to the Island under the Assisted Passage Scheme. Under a Dominion Provincial Agreement, the Island and the Federal Government defray transportation charges from Germany to Canada for these immigrants. The passage money is recovered in monthly installments from the wages of the men after they are placed on farms here. Ten dollars per month is collected for the first three months, and thereafter \$15.00 until the full amount is paid. Most of the other provinces of Canada have similar agreements. The five Germans arriving tomorrow night have been placed with the following farmers, by the National Employment Office: Mr. John Bulman, Rustico; Mr. Addison Coffin, Mt. Stewart; Mr. Ervin Robertson, East Baltic; Mr. Foster Garrett, East Baltic; Mr. Alvin MacDonald, South Lake.

The Charlottetown National Employment Office cooperates with the Provincial Department of Agriculture in assigning these men to farms. Within a few days five Dutch labourers will come to the province, and arrangements for placing them are now being made by the Employment Office. It is expected that a slow but steady movement of German and Dutch farm labourers to the province will continue for the next few months.

PEI Holstein Qualifies For Lifetime Certificate

Maplewood Linda Rooker a member of the purebred Holstein herd of Andrew M. Jardine, Freeport, P.E.I., has qualified for a Red Seal Certificate of Longtime Production presented by the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada with her eighth lactation twice-a-day milking lifetime total of 11303 lbs. milk containing 3797 lbs. butterfat. "Linda's" largest milk record was made as a seven-year-old when she produced in 365 days 16413 lbs. milk containing 534 lbs. fat. Her largest butterfat record was made in five-year-old form when she gave 552 lbs. fat from 14076 lbs. milk, average test 3.92 percent butterfat. Not only is "Linda" a good producer but she is of good conformation too, having been classified "Very Good", the second highest rating attainable in Selective Registration.
