

# Reveal Yanks Were Answering Radar Alarm

It now is revealed officially that the two old-type F-84 American jets attacked by Communist planes near the Czech border on Tuesday were not merely on patrol but were answering a direct alarm from the radar net.

The intruders turned out to be late-type Russian-made MiGs. In the matter of equipment, the U. S. sent boys out to do men's work and one of them was shot down.

The U. S. now that the unlocked door has been called so forcefully to public attention, is shipping modern Sabre jets to Germany.

It would be a strange thing, indeed, if Russia were able to supply her satellites in Europe with the most modern planes, while maintaining a full combat air force for the Korean war, and the U. S. failed to meet the challenge.

**Allies Stirred Up**

The Allied reaction to the attack on America's radar planes this week is that defence measures must be stepped up.

Britons are riled as they have seldom permitted themselves to be snubbed.

Britain has long realized that protection of its nationals abroad is a vital part of maintenance of a nation's international influence, a lesson which the U. S. once understood, but about which it has become somewhat complacent in recent years.

Britain calls the attack on the RAF plane in Germany by its real name, murder.

The U. S. has coldly informed Czechoslovakia, which has been violating the West German border with impunity, that there will be no more tolerance.

**U. S. Reaction**

First reaction from the U.S. Congress is that these new evidences of Communist barbarism obviate the idea that there can be any serious reduction in the American military program.

Russia may be trying to produce just this result, driving the Allies to spend their substance on preparedness in hope of producing an economic collapse which the Reds have always believed would give them world control.

But the Allies are able to meet the challenge in both directions, and the differences between them are overshadowed once again by the necessity of a common front. They are newly determined that the Reds are through getting away with their stuff.

**U. S. Purchases Ships From Britain**

LONDON, (AP)—The United States signed a contract Friday for the purchase of \$11,000,000 worth of minesweepers from Britain for allocation to NATO countries. The deal is part of the U. S. Navy's offshore procurement program under which the United States pays for military equipment and supplies to be built in NATO countries for Western defence.

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# Jap Premier In Trouble Over "Dirty Word"

TOKYO, (Reuters)—A government crisis precipitated by Premier Shigeru Yoshida's use of a dirty word in Parliament will culminate Saturday in a proposed vote of no confidence in his regime.

Yoshida's chances of pulling through dropped Friday night when 70 rebels from his liberal party refused to "talk things over" before the vote. They accused him of trying to "intimidate" them to return to the fold.

Counting the rebels, the Liberals have 241 seats in the Diet lower house to 225 for the three main opposition parties who proposed the non-confidence vote. If the 70 rebels should abstain, it would bring about the fall of the government.

Personal rivalries in the Liberal party, rather than disagreement over the premier's pro-Western policy, threaten his leadership. Most rebels want him to resign and permit the formation of a new Liberal cabinet.

Yoshida himself stirred up the political hornets' nest late last month by calling Soviet members a "bakayaro." The word, never used in polite society, means something a little worse than "jackass."

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"We realize that professional men and office and store clerks, during the long summer months, are shut in their offices during sunlight hours, and greatly appreciate the extra hour of daylight afforded them under Daylight Saving. This in itself is what one might call a health measure, as this extra hour of sunshine and fresh air would do much to offset the environment in which so many are placed while at their daily tasks.

"Then too, it gives the working man time to enjoy some outdoor recreations, such as golf, tennis, baseball, for those inclined that way, and the trout fisherman a longer evening in which to try his skill. Time change, and people change—possibly through the present Government has legislated against Daylight Saving; it now might consider changing the Act and allow Municipalities to institute Daylight Saving time should they so desire.

ALBANY, N. Y., (AP)—All hunters would be required to wear license plates on their backs, under terms of a bill passed Friday by the state senate and sent to the assembly.

The waterproof cardboard tags would be worn on the hunter's outer garments between the shoulder blades.

The state conference board said the tags would enable farmers to identify trespassers or hunters who damaged property.

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
